

#### Selectman's News

#### Grants: Capping the Landfill

I am pleased to report that my application for a grant to fund the decommissioning of the Town's former bulky waste area at the Transfer Station has been approved by the Connecticut Bond Commission. The \$500,000 award will enable us to complete the closure, or "capping", of the site.

This grant is very important. Like many municipalities, Deep River has been under a consent order from the D E E P to meet current environmental requirements. Although the total cost of the process will likely exceed \$600,000, some requirements have already been met. Recent Town budgets have included funding for installation of six monitoring wells, which are sampled and analyzed quarterly.

Engineering plans, prepared by the engineering firm of Nathan L Jacobson and Associates, have been approved by the D E E P. Now, with funding assured, the Town can advertise for bids. The major portion will be the actual capping; 1) trucking in hundreds of yards of approved material, to a depth of approximately two feet; 2) grading; 3) four inches of top soil, and 4) seeding.

To compensate for the increased height of the landfill surface, we will raise the concrete block retaining wall that protects the bulky waste rolloffs. My thanks to the DEEP staff for their assistance and patience as we developed our plan, and to Governor Dannel Malloy for his support of our grant application to the Bond Commission.

#### 2015 Projects:

#### **Deep River Elementary School**

At the Deep River Elementary School the section of roof between the 70's wing and the new gym has been a maintenance problem. The flat roof, installed in 1997, has leaked when it rained and has failed under the weight of the heavy, wet snows of recent years. The replacement, a more traditional pitched roof, will prevent further interior damage

From Kirtland Street to LaFayette Avenue, Plattwood Park to the Connecticut River, big yellow machines are digging, piling, trucking, dumping, screening, grading, rolling...it seems that a fair proportion of Deep River's surface has been disturbed in some manner or other.

#### Water

Along Main Street, cast iron pipe dating to 1895 has been replaced by ductile pipe that should well outlive the 120-year-old cast iron. B & L, the Connecticut Water Company's contractor, completed their work on schedule, in early August, and relocated to Read Street, which will have municipal water service for the first time. Then, be-



ginning on River Street, B & L will follow sewer construction, replacing old pipe and, in some cases, providing new service.

Our thanks to Connecticut Water and B & L for scheduling their Main Street work for the overnight hours. By choosing to have their excavators and other heavy equipment idle during the daylight hours, they avoided the disruption to Main Street commerce that daytime work would have caused.

#### Gas

By publication time, the Southern CT Gas Company will have begun installation of the six-inch diameter natural gas pipeline, from Centerbrook, north on Route 154 to the intersection with Winter Avenue. This process will be speedier than water or sewer construction—the trench is narrow, approximately 18 inches, with a maximum depth of four feet, and will be above all other utilities. Gas should be flowing in time for the upcoming heating season.

#### Sewer

Although work fell behind by about a month, the pace has picked up—we expect most areas to be done by October. With increased funding from the USDA, we have awarded the contract for Alternate #1—Kirtland Street between Phelps Lane and the Town Landing. That phase will begin when work on River Street is complete.

With the utilities safely underground, it's the Highway Department's turn: they'll upgrade or replace storm drains

and culverts, repair or replace sidewalks, then step aside (temporarily) so that reclamation, grading and rolling can be completed. Proper drainage, reclama-

tion, and compaction will add to the life of the pavement. Kirtland Street, River Street and every intersecting byway and cul de sac will be well-drained and smoothly surfaced. After two years of noise and dust, bumpiness and detours, we'll be back to normal... almost.

The first (binder) course of asphalt will be installed this fall, but we know from experience that no matter how carefully we roll and compact the reclaimed roadbed, winter's freezes and thaws will leave behind at least a few heaves and hollows. In the Spring of 2016, the finish overlay will compensate for any unevenness.

We will take advantage of the sewer expansion to finally complete the missing link in our pedestrian-friendly, walkable town—the 200 or so yards of sidewalk that will close the gap between the landing and the annoyingly abrupt terminus at River Lane.

#### **Plattwood Park**

Venuti Construction is close to fulfilling their mission to turn funding of \$443,000 into a top quality ball field, with engineered drainage and irrigation. The exercise trail, with five workout stations, will circle the field.

#### A Course in Cartoons

A few weeks ago, I took a time out from concerns infrastructural to join 53 Parks & Rec summer campers in the Carriage House of the Deep River Historical Society. Divided into four groups, the children—mostly of elemen-



tary school age, first toured the C. D. Batchelor exhibit in the Society's Stone House. Then under the tutelage of the multi-talented Tim Haut, and inspired by the trio of artists' models shown here, the budding caricaturists boldly took up their paper and pencil and offered 53 distinctly different interpretations of Miss Pat, Smitty and Jonathan.

#### The Importance of Infrastructure

Infrastructure = Economic Development;; Economic Development = Grand List; Grand List = Revenue.

Oversimplified, perhaps, but true. It is the formula for

maintaining both our quality of life and our Town's financial strength.

Our Main Street Streetscape is the most obvious example. The project, completed in five phases over a ten year period, has come to define the look and spirit of Deep River. I know this because, through my travels, meeting with State Legislators, the Chamber of Commerce or lobbying groups such as the Council of Small Towns or the Connecticut Council of Municipalities, when people hear "Deep River" their response is "brick sidewalks."

Of course the bricks and lampposts have done much more than make us pretty. The Streetscape has encouraged property owners to spruce up their buildings, attracting more shoppers and ensuring that storefronts are rarely vacant. Over time, Deep River becomes a destination.

Serving a growing customer base requires more workers... who themselves become customers. The owners of industrial forms find our Town attractive, and locate their companies in our industrial parks. The taxes on their property and equipment strengthen our Grand List, which translates into increased revenues. And with the increased income, we can better afford to maintain our infrastructure.

#### The Transfer Station — Recycling

It seems that every subject, every activity, requires a report. Whether monthly, quarterly or annually, a report must be generated. Our Transfer Station is no exception, and you

may be interested to see just how many tons, pounds and gallons passed through between July 1, 2015 and June 30, 2015:.

Commingled (paper, cardboard, bottles & cans—what we call recycling) 424.66 Tons; Batteries: 1,050 Pounds; Electronics: 78,725 Pounds; Scrap Metal: 152.59 Tons; Waste Oil: 3,775 Gallons; Tires: 5 Tons; Bulky Waste (Deep River): 546.96 Tons; (Chester): 479.88 Tons; Municipal Solid Waste (we call it trash or garbage): 3,670.96 Tons.

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#### Savings on Medical Expenses

Since the text below appeared in the Fall 2013 issue of the News, updated figures show that the PRO <u>ACT</u> card has provided real savings. The card's effectiveness varies, depending on your present medical coverage, but it costs nothing to find out if it will work for you.

Several months ago you should have received a large, colorful postcard that offered savings in the costs of medicines. The PRO <u>ACT</u> program is sponsored jointly by the Connecticut Conference of Municipalities (CCM) and its participating members. It offers savings on prescriptions (for pets, too), as well as on some vision and hearing related services. I have heard from several residents that the card has been of benefit to them. The major benefit of belonging to CCM is its focus on legislation that affects Connecticut's towns and cities. Programs such as PRO <u>ACT</u> add extra value to our membership. My suggestion is to present your card the next time you visit your Pharmacist, to see whether it may be beneficial to you and your family. If you did not receive your Pro <u>ACT</u> card or have simply mislaid it, they are available from the Town Clerk or the Selectman's Office.



#### 9 Town Transit Unveils New Slogan

This spring, 9 Town Transit (9TT) asked the public to help with a new slogan for the region's bus system. After reviewing the nearly 50 submissions, the district now has a new tag line.

"We wanted something that conveyed the impact public transit has on people's lives." explains 9TT Chairperson Leslie Strauss, "We think 'connecting your Connecticut' does just that."

#### 2015 Revaluation

The latest update on the Town's Revaluation:

As has been reported over the last few months, the Town of Deep River hired Vision Government Solutions, Inc. to assist in its state-mandated revaluation program, required every five years. The reassessment project will establish market value as of October 1st, 2015 and will be reflected in the tax bills issued in the summer of 2016.

The data mailer phase is now complete. The company has sent a data mailer to all residential taxpayers by US Postal Service. We are now jointly in the process of reviewing those that were returned and making appropriate changes in the Assessment database. Any field checks that are needed due to these returns will be made over the next few months.

Vision Government Solutions is now conducting the sales verification process to check that all sales used in the valuation steps are indeed arms length. Additionally, the Assessor's Office and the company are collecting information on all building permits. We continue to try and make our inventory as accurate as possible, only by insuring that we have accurate information can we develop accurate values during the revaluation process.

During the months of September and October, the Assessor's Office and Vision will be conducting the field review portion of the project. This will entail a drive by review of all properties from the street to ensure consistency and uniformity of data and value decisions. In the fall months we will also be updating the image data base with exterior photographs. During the month of December, we anticipate that taxpayers will be receiving a notice of valuation at which time you'll have an opportunity to meet with a member of the Vision staff or the Assessor's Office.

To become an Eagle Scout, Peter earned 38 merit badges and advanced through the seven scout



The Connecticut River Area Health District (CRAHD) is proud to announce that we are now able to provide flu shots, and we are approved as a flu vaccination provider with Medicare, Anthem and Connecticare. Applications are pending with additional insurances.

#### CT River Area Health District Receives approval for environmental class for real estate agents

The Connecticut River Area Health District has received approval from the CT Real Estate Commission for its course offered to real estate agents titled: ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH AND THE REAL ESTATE TRANSACTION.

Jim Monopoli, director of health at CRAHD, challenged his staff of 3 Sanitarians, Scott Martinson, Steve

Yenco and Ryan Grenon, to develop a course that would encompass most environmental issues that arise during the real estate sale. "Our staff deals with these issues as part of their daily jobs, and they also receive ongoing training to maintain certifications and to be better Sanitarians." stated Monopoli, "They are our local subject matter experts in these areas, and it is just a natural fit for our staff professionals to pass on their knowledge to RE agents. The better informed the agents are, certainly makes for an easier transaction for all involved."

The 3 Sanitarians worked on the course and completed it in time to offer it last winter of 2015. The course was well received and feedback from attendees indicated it is a good quality environmental primer for RE agents. During the early part of 2015, Monopoli worked with the New Haven/Middlesex Association of Realtors to get the course approved so that attendees would earn continuing education credits to attend. He was informed recently that the 3 hour course was approved for 3 CE credits. A total of 12 credits are required by agents to maintain their licenses.

The course covers topics such as asbestos, lead paint, moisture and mold, radon, drinking water wells and treatment, septic systems and lot improvement requirements.

For more information or to register for the course, Monopoli recommended that agents go through their respective realtor associations. "We anticipate that this course is one that could be offered annually, on an ongoing basis." stated Monopoli.



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

#### **Energy Assistance**

As the weather turns colder, statewide energy assistance programs that help residents with heating bills and conserving energy will begin. Programs are available from September 15th through March 31st. Connecticut Energy Assistance Program (CEAP) helps income eligible households pay there heating bills. State Appropriated Fuel Assistance (SAFA) helps the elderly and disabled individuals with their heating bills. If you received assistance last winter, you must reapply each year to receive additional assistance. Deliverable fuel applicants, (oil, propane, kerosene, coal, wood) are urged to apply early, as deliveries will begin November 15th. To make an appointment to fill out an application, please contact Rosie Bininger at 526-6033, Tuesday 9:00 – 12:00 or Thursday 1:00 – 4:00 or leave a message with your name, phone number, and best time to reach you.

#### **Operations Fuel**

Operation Fuel is a statewide private, nonprofit organization that provides emergency energy assistance to: low income and moderate income, elderly, and disabled households, which are either ineligible for government energy assistance or have exhausted their benefits. Eligibility is determined by Deep River Social Services and is based upon review of a client's completed application and satisfactory documentation of household's income, liquid assets, and crisis situation. For the 2015–2016-program year, household income for a 12-month period must fall between 200% of the federal poverty guidelines and 100% of the state median household income.

The Operation Fuel season begins December 1, 2015 and runs through May 31, 2016 or when funding runs out. Contact Social Services (526-6033) to see if you qualify.

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The Connecticut River Area Health District has received approval from the CT Real Estate Commission for its course offered to real estate agents titled: ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH AND THE REAL ESTATE TRANSACTION.

Jim Monopoli, director of health at CRAHD, challenged his staff of 3 Sanitarians, Scott Martinson, Steve Yenco and Ryan Grenon, to develop a course that would encompass most environmental issues that arise during the real estate sale. "Our staff deals with these issues as part of their daily jobs, and they also receive ongoing training to maintain certifications and to be better Sanitarians." stated Monopoli, "They are our local subject matter experts in these matters, and it is just a natural fit for our staff professionals to pass on their knowledge to RE agents. The better informed the agents are, it certainly makes for an easier transaction for all involved."

The 3 Sanitarians worked on the course and completed it in time to offer it last winter of 2015. The course was well received and feedback from attendees indicated it is a good quality environmental primer for RE agents. During the early part of 2015, Monopoli worked with the New Haven/Middlesex Association of Realtors to get the course approved so that attendees would earn continuing education credits to attend. He was informed recently that the 3 hour course was approved for 3 CE credits. A total of 12 credits are required by agents to maintain their licenses.

The course covers topics such as asbestos, lead paint, moisture and mold, radon, drinking water wells and treatment, septic systems and lot improvement requirements.

For more information or to register for the course, Monopoli recommended that agents go through their respective realtor associations. "We anticipate that this course is one that could be offered annually, on an ongoing basis." stated Monopoli.
