Memories of Dick

Reflections of an Editorial Assistant

Dick Smith left us—abruptly—during the overnight hours bracketed by Maundy Thursday and Good Friday, little more than two months into his 66th year. His accomplishments as First Selectman will become an essential part of Deep River's history. The impact of this person on those whose lives he touched—in Deep River, Hartford, throughout Connecticut—may never be fully catalogued.

As we gathered to share our understanding of the man—as we struggled to define our individual relationships (now bleakly one-sided) we focused first on the physical—the bricks and street lamps, the roadways and sewers...the inevitable granite curbing. Gradually, another theme emerged. We came to understand that Dick Smith's overarching talent was his ability to inspire. He invited us to share his vision, to support his efforts. His optimism buoyed our spirits, and Deep River's Renaissance became a self-fulfilling prophecy.

Then, as it must, life intruded. Time, having slowed to accommodate our need to reflect and to mourn, resumed its Einsteinian tick-tock. We were left to pick up where Dick Smith left off. Or not. We had accepted and approved his vision—now it would be ours, to manage on our own.

Locally, remembrances centered on Dick's passion for the Town and its people—his extended family—and for his unique interpretation of a First Selectman's job description, which included his work with the Highway Department, plowing snow, installing road drainage and, of course, piloting his Elgin Pelican.

Sweeping the roads in outlying areas is, for the most part, a one-endof-the-road-to-the-other, straight-line matter. The tedium is broken only by the need for a second pass to deal with heavy accumulations of sand and leaves, and the pauses to empty the Pelican's pouch into the waiting dump truck. Downtown, sweeping was an opportunity to exhibit his dexterity. Dick's Elgin would swoop in and out between parked cars, pirouetting gracefully through Main Street traffic.

The time and energy Dick devoted to local regional organizations— Nine Town Transit, the Connecticut River Area Health District, the 17-town Council of Governments, known as the RiverCOG, and others. He traveled frequently to Hartford to offer his small town perspective on legislative proposals, with emphasis on statutes (known as unfunded mandates) that threatened to add to towns' work load and costs, but with no provision for compensation.

Due to his extraordinary tenure and the broad areas that benefited from his oversight, many tributes were offered in Dick Smith's honor. The two that follow embody the sentiments expressed:

Janice Kollmer, long-time resident and former member of the Board of Finance, also offered her sentiments at the conclusion of the Town Budget Public Hearing on May 23rd, *"I say thank you to every single employee in this town for honoring Dick Smith's memory by proving that we are indeed "Scruffy but Proud". His dedication & devotion to Deep River is alive & well in all of us."*

In closing, we take note of the lighter side of this notorious and respected kidder. He signed his business correspondence "Richard H. Smith." The middle initial, he claimed, stood for "Humpty," good for at least a chuckle, as opposed to the entry on his birth certificate, the neither humorous nor glamorous "Howard."

Away from Town Hall, one of his favorite pastimes was to call his office and, feigning an accent, lodge a complaint about potholes or other failures of his beloved infrastructure. We who answer the phone (and whose job description demands unwavering politeness toward constituents, regardless of provocation) knew that, as long as we played the straight man, Dick would eventually break down and laugh—our triumph of will.

On occasion Dick would get caught in his own dissembling. In the course of an interview, he told an unsuspecting young reporter that the staff member in the adjacent office, clearly a senior citizen, was his father. The young woman expressed her surprise at the success of such a close working arrangement.

On her next visit, the reporter, noting that the adjacent office was unoccupied, inquired as to the "father's" well being. Dick, preoccupied with gathering material regarding the young lady's assignment, suggested that she was confused. "You must be thinking of another town hall," he suggested, then, to bury himself completely, he blurted "My father's dead."

It is because Dick was an equal opportunity story teller, just as pleased to regale an audience with his own foibles as with the missteps of others, that we have the following account: the stunned look on the shocked reporter's face jogged Smitty's memory. Since no one else was present, we have only Dick's word (and the fact that the reporter maintained her objectivity when reporting on Deep Rive) that he somehow extricated himself with grace.

No remembrance of Dick Smith would be complete without mention of his nutritional regime, which listed heavily toward carbohydrates and calories. Meatball grinders and pizza were popular choices. Peeps were a favorite mid-morning or mid-afternoon snack. And any time one appeared—the inevitable doughnut.

As for drink—in the morning, a "regular" coffee, irregularly laced with sugar and cream. The rest of the time, soda. A lot of soda. Russ Calamari, whose recounting of history is widely admired for its accuracy, claims that Dick Smith was the only customer whose excessive intake of non-alcoholic carbonated beverages dictated that he be denied further service—cut off from soda.

Dick's menu choices were subject to criticism from every direction. Family, extended family, friends, members of his staff, vendors, inspectors—anyone who visited Town Hall more than once—might be heard to wonder at the remarkable caloric intake. This is no way intended as a judgment. Many of us with impressive corporations share, in varying degree, his tendency toward immoderate dietary practices.

Unlike others of us, Dick appeared to be free of the guilt that accompanies poor food choices. He tended toward the fatalistic, sloughing off criticism with statements such as "When my time is up...my time is up."

As was the case throughout his 26 plus years of First Selectmanship, Dick Smith was right again. We will miss that air of certainty.

Lieutenant Governor Nancy Wyman Eulogy

Long-time friend Lieutenant Governor Nancy Wyman expressed her sorrow and her admiration:

"It's truly an honor to be here with all of you to reflect on our friend Richard Smith."

When you talk to people about Smitty, invariably you hear about his service to the community and the residents of Deep River.

As First Selectman, he managed the town for more than two decades he was the watchman on taxes, the cheerleader of economic development, and I can tell you from personal experience, a relentless advocate for small towns. He was also one of the leaders that helped Deep River flourish adding employers, expanding services, and making schools stronger all without losing its small-town feel. He was a town constable and always worked with resident troopers, but you could also find him in a truck helping the public works crew clean up after a storm, or in a patch of weeds taking direction from the Garden Club. In short, Smitty was what we call a renaissance man. There aren't many like him, and on that Friday we lost one of the greats.

Years ago, Smitty knew I was coming to a Chamber meeting. He met me at the door with a smile - and I immediately knew something was up. As I walked in, I came face-to-face with a stack of documents that was about four feet tall. Smitty walked around the pile and put his hand on top I'm sure he made a joke about it being as tall as I am if I took off my shoes but then he started handing me pages. Each one of these, he told me, is a mandate on the town from the state.

He tells me that unfunded mandates have got to stop. That municipalities especially small towns have to work in partnership with the state, and that the state has to recognize how burdensome this is on small towns. So, my arms are starting to fill up and I'm thinking "he isn't going to hand me this entire pile, is he?" And Smitty keeps talking ... Now I'm holding about 15 pounds of paper and he was still going, still handing me pages. I don't remember if he stopped because he couldn't see my head anymore, or if he just took pity on me. At the time I was Connecticut's Comptroller so there was very little I could do about mandates, but Smitty made his point, a point that, to this day, I recall every single day. I think about that big pile of paper whenever anyone talks about what towns should be doing.

We lost a great man on Friday: a true public servant, a man of integrity and honor, and... a man who played a mean tambourine.

My heart goes out to his children, his grandchildren, and his family and friends.

But it isn't enough just to grieve his loss. Smitty left us a legacy—to serve our communities proudly—as an elected official and as a good citizen. He taught us to be involved—sometimes that means overseeing a school renovation, celebrating the Deep River Muster, or being there for a family that needs help.

He taught us that family is the most important priority and that a whole town can be your family. I'm grateful to be surrounded by all of you now.

God bless you and God bless Smitty.

We had to because he was everywhere doing all things all the time and if you didn't grab him quick he was gone. You just didn't know if it was to another office or if he had just run out with the highway crew and never knew when he'd be back, he was everywhere. You knew when he was in the Assessor's office which was right next to ours because you could hear Robin and Milly laughing so hard that it made me laugh and I wasn't even in there. He loved to make them and everyone laugh. We all loved to celebrate at town hall, our employee birthdays were a blast but one of our favorite times of year was Christmas. Milly puts together a secret Santa Christmas gathering each year for all the town employees. In case you all forgot I'll remind you how much Dick liked granite curbing, pavement, well two Christmas' ago, Dick's secret Santa put together quit a gift. During one of the curbing jobs the guys had to cut out a round section of granite so this person decided not to let it go to waste. He gave that and coal patch to Dick as his Christmas gift, needless to say Dick loved it. When I told Christine about the piece of granite she said she was trying to figure out what the heck it was, it was just too big to be a paperweight. When it came to giving Dick a Christmas gift Cathy and I were a little selfish. We would buy him tickets to some kind of show we thought he may like but we also bought ourselves tickets so we could all go together. A few years back we went to see comedian John Pinette, who has since then passed. His shtick was all about food and we all knew Dick's feelings about food. This man was hysterical. We laughed the entire time and even just last week were talking about what a great time we had and went in his office and watch a clip for a quick laugh. These Christmas gifts I think were more for Cathy and me than Dick as we didn't have to share him with anyone. Cathy and I can only imagine their telling jokes together now.

Dick loved music and listened to it all day. I overheard Dawn say yesterday that she had to move DR1 and when she turned the suv on the music was so loud she asked herself if she should turn it off and instead turned it up louder. I'd stop and say hi when he was parked under the route 9 overpass and he'd have to turn down his music to talk. He played music all the time in his office, sometimes he literally would just break out in song and ask if you knew who it was. And of course we all know it was from the Frank Sinatra, Dean Martin era. the day when something would trigger his memory and he'd just start telling a story, did I ever tell you about....and he wouldn't wait for your response he'd just start telling it. He could remember details like no one I know. One prank was when he would introduce Jonathan as his father. Jonathan would roll his eyes and Dick would have that serious straight face making the person believe it. Dick also roped me in on some of his pranks. It took a while to perfect my game face, but after a few years we had it down. He would start in on someone and then pull me in for confirmation of his story. He would catch people so off guard, they had no idea what hit them. Every once in a while though what he was saying was so funny I would turn away so as not to see the people because I couldn't keep a straight face. Or when he told someone they had a rip in their pants and dear god he got those people every time. They all thought he was serious and would literally put their hands behind them to check.

But his latest prank was when he had to finger print someone. He told them they'd have to take prints of their feet. Their reactions were priceless, like "REALLY, you're kidding right" and of course he was but he kept them thinking he was serious. One person actually asked if she could come back because her feet probably smelled bad.

Some mornings he'd call and change his voice to be someone else. Most of the time I knew it was him and played along and we'd laugh. I think a few times I actually cried from laughing so hard. Other mornings, you could spot the breakfast club, best of friends (Pete, Ray and Smitty) after greeting the kids at the Elementary School catching up and planning the day, joking with everyone all around them, sharing their stories. What a great way to start the day and how many people have bosses that would do that. He was special.

To stand here and tell you how much he loved his family would be redundant as everyone here knows that they were all the absolute most important part of his life. As we also all know he loved Deep River more than anyone of us combined, selflessly giving all of his time to anyone who needed him. But I do know that even though at one time or another when his town employee family upset him or didn't do something the way he wanted it, he still loved us very much and were his family.

I think the laughter and stories are what I'll miss the most. He was my boss but more so my friend. I love him dearly and miss him so very much. God he so believed in you and loved you. He is yours now please take good care of him.

His political career was created over a beer and a conversation at the Deep River Inn with Art Thompson and some other Democratic Town Committee members. They saw a young and energetic man a strategic thinker and a visionary who was brilliant, innovative and creative. The town was suffering an identity crisis and Dick had a vision, and for 26 years, he has poured his heart, blood, sweat and tears into every project to create a town that people talk about. He was a perfectionist. There will never be another Dick Smith. He would say if you didn't watch the men pouring cement or laying pavement, that they wouldn't do it right and he wasn't going to let that happen and when he saw something not done to his satisfaction he made them dig it up and do it again Smitty's way. He generously gave us his knowledge, his expertise, his skills, whether we wanted to hear it or not! He was approachable to everyone. One day he said to me, "why do so many people have my cell phone number?" "Really?" is all I said.

He was deeply concerned with improving the town, and always tried to do it with the least cost to tax payers as possible. He renewed the town of Deep River during his tenure, not just by its appearance but by strengthening its tax base. Dick did not limit his work to just the town, he was a Rotarian, a member of and past leader of COST, 9 Town Transit, a member of CRAHD and CT Conference of Municipalities. He was an excellent boss and devoted father to his children and grandchildren. He was also a good friend to many of us and a great colleague. The character of the life he lived might be summed up in a few words: He was sincere, he was earnest, he was loyal and he was funny. He was the king of pranks! He loved to prank everyone: family, friends, employees were always his victims, and he usually dragged someone in on the prank to see how far he could go with it, but it always ended in laughter. He also loved to tell stories, and he had plenty of them. He had town crew stories, police stories, and vacation stories. He would always say "Honest to God, it happened that way." He rarely called anyone by their real first names he intentionally said the wrong name to them, and when you corrected him, he ignored it and continued to call you by the new name. Every new hire in the town went through this ritual.

In his career as our town leader he worked with passion, integrity and energy. By his death all the people who knew him will miss a smart, vibrant individual with a rare friendliness and charm of personality. Dick was genuinely warm and a wonderful individual, one we will miss greatly. Our sadness is lessened only slightly by the comforting thought that we had the privilege to know him. I know I speak for all of the town employees that we will miss him tremendously. Now there is an empty space where once a man worked, played, and bent down to take the hands of his children, and his children's children. It's a very large void, not so much because his physical presence is now gone, but more because the way in which he shared himself, was something that filled us all with the sense that we were someone special to him – as special as he was to us. And that space can never be filled by another person.

Deep River Horseshoe League




The Deep River Horseshoe League is starting our 61st year. This is the oldest Connecticut horseshoe league.


5th Annual Run For Chris 5K



The 5th Annual Run For Chris 5K will be held Saturday, June 25, in Essex, CT, starting at Town Hall. The race is held in memory of Christopher Belfoure, a 2005 graduate of VRHS, to raise money for the The Chris Belfoure Memorial Fund at the Community Foundation of Middlesex County.

While a student at Valley, Chris went on several school trips abroad. These experiences served as catalysts for a strong desire to learn more about what lay beyond the scope of his horizon. Chris went on to major in History and Chinese Studies at West Virginia University, where he spent a considerable amount of time studying abroad in China. He developed a keen interest in and fondness for the Chinese people and their culture (all the while becoming fluent in Mandarin). Upon graduation from WVU, Chris secured employment in Shanghai working for an international information technology firm.

Influenced by his own life-altering journeys, Chris was passionate about encouraging others to also broaden their




horizons and follow their own paths. Sadly Chris lost his life at the age of 24, so to keep his inspiration and passion alive The Chris Belfoure Memorial Fund was established in 2011. The fund is intended to perpetuate Chris's vision by helping local area high school students travel abroad.







Transfer Station

This is a friendly reminder to our long time residents and an informative fact sheet for new residents of Deep River. For our new residents, welcome! Since many towns do not have a place where you can bring your municipal solid waste (trash), the idea of a transfer station may be new to you. To assist you when using the transfer station, we would like to share the following information and transfer station procedures.

The residents of Deep River are able to use the transfer station free of charge. One of the ways that you can assist us in keeping this service free of charge is by recycling. Presently, the town gets credit for recyclables that are processed through Materials Innovation Recycling Authority (MIRA). This credit is applied to the trashtipping fee. The more our residents recycle the more credits the town receives from MIRA.

Our residents have been doing a great job recycling and our recyclable numbers continue to rise. For this, we say thank you and ask that everyone continue their efforts to recycle. Paper, magazines, bottles, cans, newspapers, and cardboard are examples of recyclable items. If you have any questions as to what items are recyclable, please check the chart located on the front of each of the specific recycle bin or ask an attendant to assistance. This is very important step in the recycling process, as the town will not receive credit from MIRA if trash is mixed in with the recyclables.

Residents using the transfer station are required to have a sticker. Stickers are monitored to ensure that only authorized individuals are using the transfer station. If you see someone using the service without a sticker, please notify the attendant.

The following information is provided to assist you when using the transfer station and to help to maintain our transfer station service free of charge to the residents of Deep River:

Electronic Recyclable: All electronics go in the gray container on top of the hill. We accept all electronic recyclables; TVs, computers, monitors, printer, etc. Once items are put in the container, please do not remove them. For safety reasons "picking" items from this container is prohibited.

Returnables: Kirtland Commons has started a recycle program for all CT 5 cent returnable bottles and cans. Please rinse out your returnable items. The redemption center will no long take returnable items that have not been rinsed.

Single-Stream Recycling: Single-stream recycling refers to a system in which all paper fibers, plastics, metals, and other containers are mixed in a collection container instead of being sorted by the resident into separate commodities (newspaper, paperboard, corrugated fiberboard, plastic, glass, etc.) and handled separately throughout the collection process. In single-stream recycling, both the collection and processing systems are designed to handle this fully commingled mixture of recyclable with materials being separated for reuse at a materials, recover facility. This is the process that we currently use to collect our recyclables. Single-stream recycling makes it easier for our residents to recycle and ultimately help to increase the amount of recycling processed through the transfer station. All recyclable items can be put in one container for easy transfer into one of the transfer station recycle bins. When recycling, please remember to Flatten All Cardboard And Rinse Recyclables. Plastic Bags and Styrofoam Are Not Recyclable. Remember, if you have a question about what is permitted to be recycled, please check with the attendant.

Municipal Solid Waste: Municipal solid waste is any residential garbage that is generated. It is basically any item you throw in your home's waste bins.

Metal: Metal items should be placed in the RED bin, which is designated specifically for metal. Even metal items that contain other materials such as plastic or wood, like vacuum cleaners and bicycles, should be placed in the RED bin as long as they are composed mostly of metal. For safety reasons, "picking" items from this container is prohibited.

Bulky Waste: Bulky waste consists of rugs, building materials, mattresses, or any other furniture. These items must not be thrown in with your trash. Separating these items from your trash saves the town money. The tipping fee for bulky waste is lower than the fee for trash. For safety reasons, "picking" items from this container is prohibited.

Transfer Station, cont.

Fees: Fees charged to residents help offset the costs the town is charged to dispose of certain items. The fee structure is as follows:

Refrigerators / Air Conditioners	\$10.00 per unit
Small Tires	\$ 1.50 each
Large Tires	\$ 5.00 each
Propane Tanks	\$ 5.00 each
Mattresses	\$ 3.00 each
Rugs over 8'X 10'	\$ 3.00 each
Brush	\$ 20.00 per load
Bulky Waste – 2 Cubic Yards	\$ 40.00
Bulky Waste – 6 Cubic Yards	\$ 75.00

In addition to the above information and procedures, please remember that ALL residents are **Required** to stop at the transfer station office prior to proceeding to the bulky waste bins, brush, or leaf areas. This rule must be adhered to in order to ensure that all items are properly processed and appropriate fees paid. Remember, stickers are required for the transfer station. Stickers are available by showing the attendant your registration or at the Town Clerk's office.

Dry Pants Model Yacht Club



Visitors to the Plattwood Park pond are usually amazed that the model sailboats have no electric motors. They are simply 1/12th scale America's Cup racing boats with sails as their only means of propulsion. These boats are all CR-914 class boats owned by members of the Dry Pants Model Yacht Club (DPMYC)

While there are 30 different radio-controlled sailing classes, all are dependent on just a few elements. First, there is the transmitter carried onshore by the sailors. It has two controls on the unit. One control moves the sails in and out; the other controls the steering. Second, there are the two actuators onboard each boat. The larger and more powerful one controls the sails. The smaller one controls the rudder. The third, and the most variable, element is the sailor. These range from very skilled skippers who accurately read the wind on the pond and exhibit smart tactical moves during each race to novices learning the art of sailing.

On a typical Sunday, we race for 1 ½ hours around a preestablished course whose orientation is determined by the wind direction that day. Each race is preceded by a one minute count-down from a small electronic starting gun. When the count gets to zero, the boats all start at the same time....The first leg of a race goes upwind to a windward mark. This involves a lot of tacking back to get to the mark...The second leg is downwind to a second turning mark. This puts a premium on steering a straight course without unnecessary movement of the rudder... The third, and final leg, is a second windward leg back to the starting line. On a windy day, we can get 12-14 races completed. On a day with light wind, we may be lucky to get 6 races completed. All races are scored and the best performer becomes the big winner for that day. Our 2016 season will be our busiest one yet. Race Day is every Sunday from 10:30 am until Noon. Mid-week, there is casual sailing every Wednesday at 5:30 pm. This focuses on self improvement, informal competition, sailing each others boats, and just talking shop. In addition, there will be two major regattas held at Plattwood Pond. The first will be the Eleventh Annual New England Spring Regatta for CR-914s on Saturday, May, 14: the second will be a larger regional regatta for members of the American Model Yachting Association (AMYA). It will be held on Saturday, September 10.

Visitors are always welcome at any of our events. If you would like to try your hand at sailing, just ask one of the sailors for a turn. If you would like to become part of our group, we welcome and help new members. Information is always available on our website. 


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Deep River Parks and Recreation




Opening Day was held at Devitt Field in Deep River on Saturday, April 30th. The First Selectman from both towns, Laura Gister and Angus McDonald, were

on hand to read the Little League Pledge and to bellow the famous words "Play Ball!"






Deep River Historical Society

The Deep River Stream was the life blood of our early factories and had a huge part in Deep River becoming the Queen of the Valley. It originates in Winthrop in the Cedar Swamp area and travels downhill alongside of Route 80 gaining speed. After Rogers' Pond it turns north running alongside or under Union, Vil-



lage, Bridge and Spring Streets before finally crossing Middlesex Turnpike. The Stream empties into the CT River near the Chester/Deep River Town Line. Its name dates back to those early settlement days even before the first homes were built here. Most settlers traveled north to Hartford by boat as the only roads were the old Indian trails. This stream was deep and difficult to ford and the area soon became known as the Deep River Plain. On old Surveyor maps the stream was used to mark borders of property. Today, the Deep River Stream pops up in a number of places but is shallow and not at all difficult to cross.



Today, it is hard to image this stream providing enough water power to support nearly ten factories along it's route to the CT River. There are at least four remaining dams on this stream and there are days in the spring especially after a rain storm where you can get a glimpse of its former power.

The Deep River Historical Society will be hosting a series of events featuring our Mills and Factories that took their power from the Deep River Stream and others that sustained us over many decades. Connecticut River Area Health District

The Connecticut River Area Health District (CRAHD) will be monitoring the Zika virus with State Health Officials and is preparing to be part of a statewide response if needed. CRAHD offers the following information and CDC links regarding the virus:

Areas with Zika: The first confirmed cases of Zika virus were reported in Brazil in 2015. Local transmission of the virus has been reported as close as Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands. Although there have been cases within the US, there haven't been any reports of locally transmitted cases in the continental USA. As of this writing, the only cases seen in the US are those returning from affected areas of the world. http://www.cdc.gov/zika/geo/index.html

Transmission: Zika virus is transmitted to people through the bite of an infected Aedes mosquito. (CT is home to Aedes species mosquitoes) Mosquitoes become infected when they bite a person infected with the virus, and then the mosquito could spread the virus to other people through bites. http://www.cdc.gov/zika/transmission/index.html

Prevention: As with other advice with mosquito transmitted diseases such as West Nile virus, avoid mosquito bites by protecting yourself. Aedes mosquitoes are very aggressive biters, and routinely bite during daylight hours, so protection from mosquito bites is required throughout the day. There currently is no vaccine or medicine to treat Zika virus. http://www.cdc.gov/zika/prevention/index.html

For Pregnant Women: Researchers are studying a possible link between Zika virus infection and birth defects, particularly microcephaly in newborns. Because of this, CDC recommends that pregnant women and women attempting to become pregnant take special precautions and follow travel restrictions to areas where Zika transmission is ongoing. It has been found that mother to fetus transmission could occur. If travel to Zika active areas cannot be avoided, strict adherence to mosquito bite prevention is warranted. It is also recommended that women in this category discuss risks with their physician prior to travel. http://www.cdc.gov/zika/pregnancy/index.html

Symptoms, Diagnosis And Treatment: About 1 in 5 people infected with Zika virus become ill, with most illnesses mild. Common symptoms are fever, rash, joint pain, conjunctivitis, muscle pain and headache. If you are sick enough to seek medical attention, and have traveled to an area where Zika virus is active, you should let your Doctor know. Zika virus can be identified through a specialized blood test. Treatment is of symptoms only. http://www.cdc.gov/zika/symptoms/index.html Please refer back to these sites as spring and summer approaches and mosquitoes become active in Connecticut. The Connecticut River Area Health District is the local health department for the towns of Old Saybrook, Clinton, and Deep River.



Broadcasts are sponsored by the Deep River Taxpayers Association to make municipal business and discussions available to a wider audience of citizens.




Rocks and Roll
