

#### Kirtland / River Street Area Sewer Expansion

I am very pleased to report that, as of this writing, this major expansion is nearly done. Once pump stations 1 & 2 have been energized, we should be ready for operation.

In 1989, the first phase of Deep River's sewer system served properties where sewage needs were most acute, mostly along Main Street. As funding became available, other areas were phased in. Today our municipal sewer is just one of the public utilities that serve our needs.

It was not always thus. My thanks to Chester resident Ben Bellows for letting us reproduce excerpts from this carefully preserved issue of the *New Era*. The *New Era* covered Middlesex County for more than 75 years (10 cents an issue, \$3.00 for a year's subscription). This 1949 editorial looks back to the paper's 1878 opinion piece about sewers, then continues in the present, with a timeline—1891, 1906, 1940—of failed attempts at sewers. Forty years later sewers finally came to Deep River.

The heart of our wastewater processing system is its innovative treatment plant. Despite more than tripling its use, it has capacity to spare. In 2015, still in the technological vanguard, the WPCA received the "Award for Outstanding Wastewater Operations," presented by the Atlantic States Rural Water & Wastewater Association.

I will include historically-timely *New Era* news in future Selectman's News articles. Thanks again, Ben.

## Nothing New About This Problem

"Our annual meeting occurs soon, for the election of town officers, and the transaction of other business. Some work has been done in the way of opening sewers on Main Street—one nearly opposite the site of the new bank building, another near Bushnell's store. Now we want to see more of the work done, somewhere not a great way from the Post Office, or wherever needed. This will be a good investment, as thorough drainage is conductive to health, and the present is a good time to continue to make them, on account of cheap labor. The heaviest tax payers in town, are in this village and the taxes paid by manufacturers and others here, entitle them to share the use of the funds raised by taxation. While we do not advocate lavish expenditures, we do urge a moderate one. Let us have more sewers as soon as the town, or the authorities think the state of finances will admit. There has been considerable sickness in this village; in fact there is at present, but the patients, most of them are now convalescent. While the sickness may not be attributed to any defective sewerage, an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure, and let us have it."

The above editorial is quoted verbatum from The New Era of SEPTEMBER 20, 1878!

Not only does it express a hope that seventy-one years later has not been realized, but it serves to illustrate the fact that the sewer problem in Deep River is by no means a new one. It has been definitely in people's minds that sewers are needed here for at least three-quarters of a century.

And don't think that after 1878, up 'til now, the entire matter was forgotten—not by any means. For instance, in 1891 there was agitation to stop pouring raw sewage from the center of the village into the brook. Pratt Read had offered a reward of \$25 to anyone who disclosed the source of sewerage that was emptying into the Keyboard Pond. In 1906 and in 1940 (as most people will recall) surveys were carried out and recommendations made by town-appointed committees for correcting the difficulties . . . but nothing has been done to this day—Oct. 6, 1949.

#### **Infrastructure Projects**

Budget Year 2015-16 was as busy a construction season as we have had during my time in office. With most projects complete we can enjoy the fruits of our labors: sewers, new water lines, natural gas, new drainage and reconstructed roadways. Busy, yes—but worth it. And although I could fill many pages with design and construction details, this brief summary should suffice.

#### Hemlock & Westbrook

Sections of Hemlock Drive and Westbrook Road have been milled and repaved.

#### Fairview & Read

Fairview Avenue drainage upgrades, which include a new catch basin, connected with 12" pipe, and 60 feet of 36" pipe to carry the brook from west to east. Both roads were reclaimed, and had their binder course of Class 1 asphalt installed.

#### River Street

The Highway Department is installing 600 feet of new drainage pipe and building four new catch basins. Then, when the new water line is complete (presently about half done) we will finish reclamation and install the binder course of class 1 asphalt.

#### **Road Striping**

We contracted with Safety Markings Company to wear make epoxy safer for the motoring public.

#### **Elementary School**

When drainage, additional curbing, reclamation, and paving were complete, Safety Markings delineated the parking, handicapped and "no parking" areas. By realigning curbing and sidewalks we created five new parking spaces: two in the circle, and three on River Street.

#### Town Hall

We solicited bids for the maintenance of windows gas service.

and window trim: removal of old paint and two coats of primer. The sole bidder, Scholar Paint ing Company, met the Town's requirements for state certification and insurance coverage, and were awarded the contract. They arrived with a full complement of ladders and sheets of plastic to contain the chipped flakes of paint.

#### Plattwood Park

Concurrent with the sewer expansion, water line replacement, drainage upgrades and other infra structure improvements, we completed Plattwood Park's new baseball diamond. It will be ready for play next Spring; in the meantime, check out the walking trail that circles the field. And do pause to try out the six exercise stations. The en tire project was built to perfection by the Venuti Brothers of Killingworth. Their experience in this specialized area of construction is evident in their workmanship. I'm very proud that Deep River ranks so highly in maintaining and improving our infrastructure.

#### **Natural Gas**

Two major factors accounted for the timely completion of the six-inch natural gas pipeline: experenced work crews and warm, dry weather. Once freed from construction deadline angst, I happily rejoined the "I Hope it Rains Soon" coalition.


#### Main Street Repaying

With the final, permanent patching of the water main and pipeline excavations, Main Street will be a smooth ride throughout the winter. Next spring or early summer the entire width, curb to curb, will be leveled by the milling machine, then it will be paved with the traditional two Thank you, Connecticut Magazine. inches of class 2.

The bumps, the dust, the disruptions to traffic—all will be in our past. That will complete two years of construction. Both above ground and below, Main Street will be totally 21st Century.

#### Hometown Pride



I will not attempt an analysis—you'll find an explanation of the survey's criteria and methodology in the magazine. I will simply relax and enjoy their conclusions.



#### Industrial Development - Progress at Plattwood



On January 6, 2014, residents at a Town Meeting affirmed the purchase four acres (+ or -) to expand Plattwood Industrial Park (PIP). This presented an opportunity to add three buildings (29,000 square feet of commercial / industrial space) to strengthen Deep River's Grand List, increase bring more jobs and expand the customer base for our retail sector.

#### News from the Town Clerk

As the Municipal Election winds down and we start to gear up for the 2016 Presidential Election, I wanted to again thank the voters of Deep River for allowing me to serve the residents of this great town as Town Clerk.

Do you find it difficult to vote at the polls due to your permanent physical disability? Public Act No. 12-57 created permanent absentee balloting status for certain individuals. To be eligible for permanent absentee ballot status, an elector must file with the Town Clerk an absentee ballot application together with a doctor's

certificate stating that they have a permanent disability and are unable to appear in person at their polling place. The doctor's note should be on letterhead. There is no prescribed form - the doctor's note and the absentee ballot application would satisfy the requirement of the law. Permanent absentee ballot status enables the elector to automatically be mailed an absentee ballot for each election, primary, and referendum in the municipality in which they are eligible to vote without having to apply each time. 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
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#### **Community Health Committee**



#### **Deep River Historical Society**

It's a Mile Marker



Middlesex Turnpike opened for travel in 1807, connecting the Boston Post Road in Saybrook to Hartford. This provided the post riders a safe and efficient way to travel. Brownstone mile markers were placed at one mile intervals along the route. This brownstone marker on the Society's property was rescued and relocated to its current

position as a result of the Works Progress Administration (WPA) project. During the depression one of the WPA projects putting men back to work was to replace missing, broken or damaged mile markers. These newer markers are easily spotted due to the fact they are made out of pink granite quarried in the State of CT. The true 33 mile marker is just north of the Society on the Daniels property. Mile marker 34 is located near the entrance to Kelsey Hill Road. And mile marker #32 is located just over the Deep River, Chester town line. History enthusiasts can trace the original Middlesex Turnpike through these existing markers. I would also like to reassure all of those who inquired, there is no one buried in the Society's front lawn. We appreciate your questions and concerns so please don't hesitate to ask if you have any further questions.

Elephant tusks from Africa were brought to Deep River Landing for local factories to make piano keys, buttons, and billiard balls. Up to 100,000 elephants a year were killed, their tusks transported by slaves, to sustain this trade. Deep River remembers its debt to this majestic creature as it looks forward to a new future as "Queen of the Valley."

The Deep River Club is a local chapter of Rotary International, devoted to the club motto of "service above self." The Club meets at the Ivory Restaurant every Tuesday at 12:15 and guests are always welcome. 
#### Rotary Student of the Month

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#### Yale Invitational



On September 20th, Caitlin Lent, of Valley Regional High School, competed in the Yale Invitational, a national speech and debate competition held annually at Yale University. This tournament offers every form of speech and debate recognized by the National Speech and Debate Association. Caitlin competed

in Student Congress, which drew over 150 students from all over the United States and several countries.

There were ten chambers in this year's Student Congress, with fifteen members per chamber. Each student could submit one piece of legislation, which would be put on the docket to be discussed. Student Congress, (Legislative Debate) is a form of interscholastic high school debate in the United States. Basically, it is a simulation of the U. S. legislative process in the Senate and the House. Students throughout the tournament, generate a series of bills and resolutions for debate, and deliver speeches for and against each bill's merits. Bills usually include topics in the areas of domestic, economic, and foreign affairs. One student in each chamber is elected to preside as a presiding officer to ensure the debates run smoothly.

Caitlin, as a member of her chamber, had to prepare for debate on numerous topics in any given area. Speakers needed to come up with fresh ideas as well as refuting previous speakers to keep the debate process successful. To score in Student Congress, students need to network, think analytically, be persuasive, and enjoy research. Congress rewards students for taking risks and not fading into the background. The reward for students is learning how to make a permanent change in the world through leadership and being able to understand and debate both sides of a piece of legislation.
