News from the Selectman's Office

While I doubt that winter is, in fact, dead, spring seems to have sprung after a relatively easy winter at least when it comes to snow. In issues past I have written about my enjoyment of all seasons, including winter, and that still holds true. That said, and despite the easy season, it is time for spring. I am ready to put away my skis, take the snow tires off the car, and start some seeds in the window and plan the garden. Spring training is underway, March Madness has begun, (the Huskies, both men and women, finished the season strong), the VRHS Musical has completed its run (I hope you took time to see an excellent production of Little Shop of Horrors), DRC Little League teams are being put together, the 40th anniversary of the Fishing Derby is being planned, and budget workshops have begun. Lots to do; try and have some fun.

The Future of Trash in Deep River...

Deep River Transfer Station Household Trash and Food Scrap drop-off program is off to a great start and diverted over 3,650 pounds of food scraps from the waste stream in the first two weeks. Just as importantly we have reduced the waste thrown in the compactor by 26 tons in the first month of the program. Not only does this show what can be done to reduce waste, but these numbers add up to real savings in our budget.

Our town launched its Waste Reduction Pilot Program on February 1st to incredible results. We are one of eighteen towns awarded a grant to run a pilot program that aims to help residents separate their food scraps from their regular garbage, thus reducing the volume and weight of each household's trash.

Approximately 550 of our residents using the transfer station have received 100 orange trash bags and 50 green food scrap bags which should last the duration of the one-year pilot. Participants are asked to separate their household waste

by placing food scraps in the green bags and regular trash in the orange bags. This is an opportunity for families to re-think waste disposal, reducing the amount of trash they produce by increasing recycling, donating textiles, and purchasing reusable products instead of disposable ones. When the bags are full, Deep River's residents bring the bags to the transfer station to drop them off in the corresponding bins, where the food scraps get transported to an anaerobic digester to create renewable energy and soil amendments.

The goal of the program is to pilot this new waste management system at the transfer station and use the data collected to determine if the town wishes to adopt a permanent program in the future. Residential participation in the early stages of this program are showing promising results. In addition, this waste reduction program aims to help the State of Connecticut address the statewide waste crisis. Deep River received funding for this program through a Sustainable Materials Management grant from the CT Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP).

Change local habits, change the world

I could not be more pleased with the early results from the waste reduction program. As stated above, the Town saved over \$3,000 in February on hauling fees. That is not from food scrap separation alone. It is too early to say for sure, but it appears as though people are thinking a little more about what goes where. I have learned how little I truly understood about recycling, and I am more than a little frustrated with how little in compliance I have been all these years. I found myself a little overwhelmed and in response I thought, what if I just focus on plastic? I had a conversation with my 91 year old mother-in-law about trying to cut plastic out of my life and she told me in no uncertain terms, as any good mother-in -law will do, that this would be impossible. I argued a bit, as any good son-in-law should do, and came home determined. Well, coincidentally, a few days later a friend gave me an article written by A.J. Jacobs entitled "My pursuit of zero plastic," in which he describes trying to spend a day without plastic. After much prepara-

tion he discovered, much to my dismay, that for all practical purposes it is an impossible task. Plastic is everywhere.

So, what to do? My thinking, based on Jacob's article and a bit of reflection, is to start small. Jacobs tells us that the world produces around 400 metric tons of plastic a year, almost half of which is discarded after a single use. Easy for me to find a new goal; eliminate as much single use plastic as I can, not all at once, but through small changes. Stop with the plastic water bottles, stop with produce bags at the grocery store. See how that works. Change a couple habits and then find another.

I suggest that we look at our little waste reduction program in the same way. I am only one person, and my efforts will likely not change the world. But I can do something. We each can do something. So we talk with our neighbors and through these exchanges, we might change our neighborhood. If enough neighbors agree and try, we might make change in our town. If enough towns change, we might change our county, and if enough counties change, we might change our state, one household at a time.

New Wheels

Exciting times in Deep River. Thanks to you all for supporting our efforts last spring and voting to upgrade our local fleet with a new Fire Engine, Plow Truck, and Police Cruiser. As of this writing Engine 551 is having finishing touches added and will be stationed at the fire house and on our front line very soon.

I often think when I repair my snow blower I have ensured that little, if any, snow will fall. That seems to have worked with the arrival of our new plow truck, delivered just in time to watch the season go by with only a couple small storms. Well, we are ready for you next year, Mr. White Christmas.

We have also added a new Ford Explorer to our police fleet, and you should see Paul cruising the streets in her by the time this is published.

Upcoming Road Work

We are going to bid for paving of sections of River Road, Westbrook Road, Bushy Hill, and Union Street this summer, as well as following up on the crack filling and treatment of Kelsey Hill with a chip seal project of the road in its entirety. We will notify you as the schedule becomes clear.

Thanks and Praise

A big thank you to Eric and Erin Ingram for their donation of the spectacular holiday tree that decorated our Town Hall this season. We are lucky to have such generous residents, and I think we might be enjoying this family's trees for at least a couple more years. Thank you.

And a shout out to our Parks and Recreation Director, Carol Jones. While she has done exemplary work over the years, she and her department have been recognized for her efforts by the Community Foundation of Middlesex County "Good People doing Great Things" Award and have been granted \$250 that will be used for scholarships for young people enrolling in the summer camp program. Great job, Carol, and thank you to the Community Foundation.

Budget

It is budget time again

At this time of year, though our thoughts (mine anyway) may turn to baseball and gardens, we acknowledge that preparation of next year's budget takes priority. We initiate our process coincident with Governor Lamont's announcement of his proposed state budget. Much to my chagrin, we are all fully aware that our budget will be completed and approved well before the State's budget is. We already know that our ADM (Average Daily Membership), relative to Chester and Essex, will require a significant increase in Deep River's contribution to Region 4, really presenting Deep River with a 1.5 mil increase before we even start our budget process. Be assured that the Board of Selectmen and the Board of Finance are working diligently to fund our town responsibly, but that as individual citizens it is important for each of us to consider attending both Region 4 and Deep River budget meetings.

Our Public Hearing is scheduled for a date to be determined in late April and the Annual Town Meeting is, as always, scheduled for the third Monday in May, this year, May 15. We look forward to seeing you there.

Dog Licensing Begins June 1st!

Why license your dog?

- Even if it's unlikely, dogs do get out and can get hurt or even stolen. Licensing your dog helps us to reunite you quickly.
- 2. This nominal fee helps support the hundreds of stray, neglected and abandoned pets in our state.
- 3. It's the law! If you have a dog, you are required by law to have him or her licensed in your town of residence. We will send license renewal postcards to registered dog owners to begin renewal on June 1st. (Sorry but we can't issue licenses before that date). These renewals can be done in person or by mail but all dog licenses MUST be renewed by June 30, 2023 to avoid paying a late fee. PLEASE NOTE: Your dog's rabies vaccine must be in effect on or after July 1, 2023 in order to be licensed. Please call your vet now to be sure your dog is protected.

Spring means Fishing - the DEEP Hunting and Trapping Guide and Fishing Guide are available online at https://portal.ct.gov/DEEP-CT-Outdoor-Guides. Hunting and Fishing licenses are also available online at https://ct.aspirafocus.com/internetsales and at the Town Clerk's office.

The Sustainable CT program (sustainablect.org) suggests literally hundreds of actions for a sustainable committee like ours to tackle! So, our work continues. Below are the highlights of our current work and future plans:

Food Scraps

After 3 months of our food scrap pilot program, we can confidently say it's going very well. Within the first week of the pilot we had to bring in more containers to hold the scraps collected. Within the first month we were collecting over 10 bins of food scraps. That is a won-



derful start! As of this writing, bags were still available to those who want to participate but haven't yet taken the plunge. Bags can be picked up at the Town Hall and transfer station with a current transfer station sticker.

By diverting food scraps from our waste stream, we reduce tipping fees (the cost to haul our waste), emissions produced to haul the waste out of state, and also convert our food scraps into compost and green energy. Keep up the good work Deep River!

Thin Plastics

To further reduce waste, we have set up NexTrex recycling bins at the library and Adams' recycling center to collect plastic bags and thin film plastic. This type of plastic cannot be put in the regular blue recycling bin. As part of the NexTrex community challenge, if we collect over 500 pounds of thin film plastic by August, we will earn a bench made of the recycled plastic material. Of course, the biggest benefit is removing all that plastic from the waste stream. It is shocking how much of this type of plastic pervades our lives. You will be amazed how it accumulates when you start saving it for recycling.



Assessor's Office

The Assessor's Office is responsible for establishing the value of property for ad valorem tax purposes; for discovering, listing, and valuing all taxable and taxexempt properties; and to ensure that the individual property owner's value is proper so that the owner pays no more than their fair share of the property tax. In the performance of these duties, assurance is made that no property escapes the assessment process or is under assessed and that no property owner received unauthorized preferential treatment. Revaluations are completed every five years in conformity with the Connecticut General Statutes and Revaluation Performance Standards. Development and updating of information are conducted on an ongoing basis, including modernization of computerized records of real estate, personal property and motor vehicles. Duties are performed in compliance with State of Connecticut mandated General Statues.

The Assessor's Office also administers many programs that are available to our residents. If you feel you qualify for any of the following programs, please contact our Office at (860) 526-6029 or visit the Town website at www.deepriverct.us for additional information.

- 1. Veterans: If you are a veteran of any war period so declared in the Connecticut General Statutes, you may be entitled to an exemption. You must provide an original or certified copy of your Honorable Discharge or similar document to the Deep River Town Clerk. The dates of eligibility change often, so contact the Assessor's office to make sure you qualify. Filing Deadline: September 30, 2023 for the 2023 Grand List.
- 2. Veterans with less than honorable discharge: Section 12-91(19) as amended by P.A. 18-47. Veterans with other than honorable discharge having a qualifying condition, which means a diagnosis of post traumatic stress disorder or traumatic brain injury, or a military sexual trauma experience may be entitled to an exemption. The veteran cannot have been discharged under dishonorable or for bad conduct conditions. Proof must be submitted from the U.S. Department of Veteran Affairs.
- **3.** Additional Veterans' Exemption: If you receive a veteran's exemption, you or your spouse may

be eligible for an additional reduction in taxes for the next assessment year. This program has income requirements. As determined by the Office of Policy and Management, the income limit, including Social Security is \$40,300 for single persons and \$49,100 for married couples. Filing Period: February through October 1, 2023.

- 4. Active-Duty Military and Active-Duty National Guard: If you have 90 days or more cumulative service during a designated war period you may be entitled to an exemption. You must provide a letter stating active-duty status, filed annually by September 30th with the Town Clerk. If you have a vehicle, you may also be entitled to an exemption of that vehicle. Contact our office for more information regarding a vehicle exemption.
- 5. Leased Vehicle Exemptions: Active-Duty Military/National Guard and Veterans may be entitled to a refund of taxes for a leased vehicle. Either the Active-Duty Military Vehicle form or the Veterans Leased Vehicle form is required to be filed with the assessor. Filing Deadline: Not later than the thirty-first day of December next following the assessment year during which such tax was paid.
- 6. Disabled Veterans: Veterans claiming disability exemptions must submit proof from the Veterans' Administration to the Assessor during the assessment period stating the percentage of disability in order to receive the proper amount of exemption. A subsequent filing is required only when there is a change in the percentage of disability. Filing Deadline: You may file until the Board of Assessment Appeals completes its duties.
- 7. Non-Resident Active-Duty Military: A non-resident active-duty military service person stationed in Connecticut on military orders may be eligible to an exemption of all personal property listed in the "Service Members Civil Relief Act" including motor vehicles owned by the service member and/or spouse.
- 8. 100% Totally Disabled: Under certain circumstances, residents who are receiving permanent disability benefits under the Federal Old Age Survivors and Disability Insurance Program or certain other qualifying programs may be entitled to receive a \$1,000 property exemption

- off your assessment upon submission of qualifying proof and the application to the Assessor. Filing Deadline: Filed until the completion of the Assessor's Duties; Signing of the Grand List.
- 9. Blind: If you or your spouse is legally blind you may be entitled to a \$3,000 exemption off your assessment. A Certificate of Blindness from a licensed physician or a Certificate of Blindness from State of Connecticut Board of Education and Services for the Blind is required. Filing Deadline: File until the signing of the Grand List.
- are a resident and the owner of the property and you or your spouse is 65 or older by December 31, 2022 or considered to be permanently disabled, you may be eligible for a reduction in taxes. The income requirements as determined by the Office of Policy and Management cannot exceed \$40,300 for single persons and \$49,100 for married couples including Social Security. Contact the Assessor's office if you believe you may qualify. Filing Period: February through May 15, 2023.
- 11. Local Option Elderly of Disabled Exemption Program: The Town provides an additional credit for qualifying applicants. The maximum allowable income for this program mirrors the State program. Homeowners must also be current on their property taxes as of the date of application and be a resident of Deep River for 5 years or more preceding the year of credit in order to be eligible. Filing Period: February through May 15, 2023.
- 12-81(56), (57), (62), and (63) allow for an exemption on certain renewable energy systems. An initial application is required to be filed with the Assessor's Office by November 1st of the assessment year to which the owner first claims the exemption. Failure to file such an application in the manner and form as provided by such Assessor within the time limit prescribed shall constitute a waiver of the right to such exemption for such assessment year.
- 13. Tax Exempt Organization: Connecticut General Statutes §12-81(7), (10), (11), and (16) require the filing of a Tax-Exempt Return seeking property tax exempt status. Please contact the Assessor's Office for additional information.


Did you Register a Vehicle AFTER October 1, 2022? If so, you will receive a Supplemental Bill payable in January 2024 for the new or replacement vehicle that was registered after October 1, 2022.

Did you get RID of a car AFTER October 1, 2022 AND have not transferred the plates? If you no longer have your vehicle and have canceled the plates, please contact our Office or visit the Town website for a listing of documentation needed to remove or adjust your current vehicle assessment. If the Assessor's Office does not receive proper documentation, it will result in a 12-month bill due July 2023.

Address Changes for Real Estate and Personal Property - It is important that you report your address change to EITHER the Assessor's or Tax Collector's Office. Motor Vehicle mailing addresses are generated from your registration with the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) and can only be updated through the DMV.

Information on all properties is available on the Deep River website www.deepriverct.us and continues to be available in the Assessor's Office. 



It's a plane!

Carl Yusna, professional photographer, and avid World War II history buff spent more than 8 months recreating a Pratt Read Glider in the field of the Deep River Historical Society property.

For travelers on Rt 154, many have noticed the man on the historical society grounds who appears to be kneeling or sitting on the ground. He has caused quite a stir. Carl Yusna, who has been researching Pratt Read Gliders for years, spent the summer of 2022 painting the outline of Deep River's WACO Glider on the field. The purpose was to give visitors an idea of the size of these silent planes.

During the Christmas Season, Carl outlined the plane in solar lights. Chester may have its stars and Ivoryton, a million lights but only Deep River can say they have a Pratt Read Glider. The gliders have a Christmas connection as well. The Battle of the Bulge raged over the week of Christmas in December 1944. Heavy snows and bitter cold temps hampered supply routes. The Pratt Read gliders had a positive impact on December 26th arriving with much needed supplies to enable the Allies to push the Germans back over the Rhine River.

Carl's story is not over yet as he is working on making this outline permanent with bricks salvaged from the Veteran's Memorial Green. The Veteran's Green had a brick section in front of Columbia. Those bricks were removed to create the current area with white bricks for Deep River's fallen soldiers of WWII. Now these salvaged bricks will be used to outline the glider.

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

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

Working Toward a Healthier Deep River

Community The Community Health HEALTH Committee (CHC) is currently comprised of 8 members. The committee is tasked with oversee-

ing and raising funds for the Community Health Fund (CHF), providing support for the town's social service programs, it's social service director and the town's food pantry among other things.

To meet these challenges, the committee holds food drives, an annual financial appeal, and other fundraisers throughout the year in order to collect and purchase food for the Deep River food pantry and to raise money for social service programs and the department. The CHC was created in 2010 and continues to serve a vital part of our community. This winter, in particular, has seen a sharp increase in our neighbors seeking assistance for heating fuel, household bills and food. Therefore, the committee is so thankful to the members of the public who came out and voted to allocate ARPA (American Rescue Plan Act) funds to the CHF. These monies will go far to help Deep River residents, identified by social services, who need help with heating fuel costs and food.

Committee members are voted into their positions at town meetings. Our newest members are Betsey Scholfield and Jacki Calamari. The other members of the committee are: Tracy Woodcock, Chair; Lori Gregan, Vicechair; Nancy Howard, Dawn Norton, David Blifford, Chris Brooks and Carol Jones.

Deep River's Social Service Director is Rosie Bininger. Rosie works part time in Deep River and also serves as the social service director in Chester. Her office hours are Tuesday 9-12 and Thursday, 1-4. Her office and the food pantry are located at 56 High Street, next to Tri-Town Youth Services and Parks & Recreation. The food pantry is available free to any Deep River resident in need. If you need other assistance, please make an appointment to meet with Rosie. Her phone number is 860-526-6033.

Our fall 2022 annual appeal has been completed and we are so grateful to all who have donated. We set a goal to raise \$9000.00 and close to \$8,700.00 was collected. That money has been used to purchase food for the weekly backpack program that CHC runs for 14 DRES students, purchase food for the food pantry, and

to purchase gift cards to Adams and Cumberland Farms that the social service director can give out. The money has also gone towards fuel assistance.

The holidays brought out the best in our local community! CHC worked closely with DR Social Services, the Rotary Club, Tri-Town Youth Services and the DR Fire Department, and the holiday toy drive brought in a record-breaking number of toys and donations! Deep River families who needed some help this holiday season were overwhelmed by the generosity of the community. This past holiday season saw more volunteers, who chose to 'adopt' a child (or family) identified by the Social Service Director, in order to purchase a specific gift or gifts from their 'wish' list, outnumber the actual number of families who requested help! We even received two large donations of \$1000.00 from James Howard of Howard Tree Services and Tim Lee of Top Notch Electrical Services to buy gifts or food for deserving families.

We are also thankful to our community partners who help out the food pantry and our social service director throughout the year. Local civic groups such as the Rotary Club, the Elks, the Deep River Fire Department and local churches in Deep River and Chester are important contributors.

The committee continues to administer the Backpack program for students at Deep River Elementary School. This program ensures that students who might otherwise face food insecurity on the weekends do not go without. Members of the committee have taken turns shopping for food items, assembling bags and having them ready for DRES's social worker to distribute on Friday mornings. Although we are a small but mighty group; we still need help! Thank you to the Deep River Rotary Club and to a dedicated group of town hall employees who have donated their time to shop and fill backpacks, so that the program can continue 12 months a year. Would you like to help with this weekly program? If so, please call the town hall and leave a message for the CHC. We would love the help. It is a wonderful program but a great deal of work for a small committee to take on alone.

Beginning last fall, we also have received assistance from the Shoreline Soup Kitchens & Pantries (SSKP) which recently created a Backpack support program. Audrey Brainerd, manager of SSKP Old Lyme Pantry, serves as

coordinator of this program. On a monthly basis, Audrey prepares a large donation of food items for the CHC backpack program to supplement our weekly menus. These donations have helped us immensely in keeping costs down. So, thank you to Audrey and her staff for this assistance.

If you are looking for other ways to help, donations are always sought and appreciated. Items can be dropped off in the lobby of the Tri-Town Youth Services building at 56 High Street or at Town Hall during office hours. You may also order items on-line and have them shipped directly to the pantry if that is easier. Gift cards are also appreciated. Monetary donations should be dropped off or mailed to the town hall, with checks made payable to the 'Community Health Fund.'

As we move into spring, the pantry is in need of the following food items:

- Canned tuna, chicken, or deviled ham
- Hearty soups/stews
- Juice
- Coffee/tea (small 1 lb. containers)
- Canned fruit
- Boxed or shelf milk
- Cereal/oatmeal
- Crackers and snacks
- Paper products (paper towels, toilet paper)
- Toiletries are appreciated (soap, deodorant, tooth-paste, shampoo, etc.)

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Planning & Zoning

Update to the Plan of Conservation & Development - Public Survey

The Planning & Zoning Commission seeks input on the Plan of Conservation & Development

As was noted in the Winter 2022 newsletter, the Deep River Planning & Zoning Commission, led by an Ad-Hoc Committee is in the process of updating the Town's 10-year Master Plan, known as the Plan of Conservation & Development (PoCD). This Plan, which was last updated in 2015, will help set the direction for the community's next decade.

The Committee began with a long discussion of a Vision Statement, which sets the tone for the Plan overall. The current draft of the vision, which is subject to modification, concludes with the following:

We envision a Deep River that forms the economic, educational, housing, cultural, recreational, and civic hub of the lower River Valley. We envision growth and development, including redevelopment, that encourages civic and inclusive economic participation that also maintains and supports the Town's high quality of life and protects our natural resources. We envision a plan of conservation and development that prioritizes our economic growth as a catalyst for achievement of future goals of the Town. We envision Deep River leading the ever-closer interconnection of the three-town region.

The Committee is now seeking public input on how this vision will play out. They have set up an online survey, to identify the most desired land uses for each of several geographic areas of Town. The goal of this survey is to help determine (or confirm) what sort of preservation or development efforts would be most desired in Winthrop, the River Road residential area, Deep River Landing, Downtown/Main Street, and other neighborhoods. Whether it is a new piece of protected forest land near the Killingworth line, a conversion of a former factory to apartment lofts, or the opening of a boutique apothecary on Main Street, the survey attempts to target specific future uses in different areas.

The Connecticut River is a corruption of the Mohegan word "quinetucket" and Nipmuc word "kwinitekw" which mean beside the long tidal river. The

"kwinitekw" produces 70% of the fresh water flowing into Long Island Sound and is the longest river in the New England region. It flows through four states and its watershed encompasses 11,260 square miles. The next time you have the opportunity to view this river, think of the places it's been through and the grandeur it has witnessed along its journey to the ocean. Near the river, is New England's greatly traversed, occupied, and developed land.

Since its founding in 1975, The Deep River Land Trust (DRLT) has preserved more than 250 acres. The Land Trust has accepted stewardship responsibility of these properties throughout the town, removing litter, encouraging native plants and animals, and holding educational events to help the surrounding community better develop an appreciation for the landscape. To get a better idea of which property is closest to your location please follow this link to the official site for the Land Trust https://deepriverlandtrust.org/. Once opened you will not only find a listing of the maps but upcoming events, a history of the DRLT, recent state grants supporting land acquisition and a membership application. By becoming a member of the DRLT you will be joining a network of likeminded individuals/ families whose support helps us to continue the work of preserving open space (available to the general public) for present and future generations.

Long time board member of our local land trust, Janet Stone, has coined the phrase "Think globally and hike locally." This simple but powerful concept can be used to motivate each of us to put on our shoes and go for a walk. Our town is graced with an abundance of open space and a network of sidewalks more extensive than almost any surrounding town. There has been a growing recognition of the benefits both physical and psychological of immersion in nature. The Blue Zones website has listed a number of health benefits accrued from walking in natural landscapes.

A recent study from the American Cancer Society followed 140,000 older adults and reported that those who walked six hours per week had a lower risk of dying from cardiovascular disease, respiratory disease, and cancer than those who were not active, but that walk-

ing even as little as two hours per week could begin to reduce the risk of disease and help you live a longer, healthier life. https://www.bluezones.com/2018/07/ research-says-walking-this-much-per-week-extendsyour-life/. This information regarding the effects on our physical wellbeing is great news, but there are also psychological benefits as noted in Science Daily, "We found that spending time in, or living close to, natural green spaces is associated with diverse and significant health benefits. It reduces the risk of type II diabetes, cardiovascular disease, premature death, and preterm birth, and increases sleep duration. People living closer to nature also had reduced diastolic blood pressure, heart rate and stress. In fact, one of the really interesting things we found is that exposure to green space significantly reduces people's levels of salivary cortisol -- a physiological marker of stress." https://www.sciencedaily.com/releases/2018/07/180706102842.htm

All of this is good news and should send all of us who are able out the door and into the magic of the great outdoors. As the Canadian Poet Margaret Atwood has stated, "In the spring, at the end of the day, you should smell like dirt."

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

Deep River Elementary School

It has been a busy past few months at Deep River Elementary School as we enter into the final trimester of the school year in March. We have spent much of the past few months deep in teaching and learning while taking the time to develop students' social emotional skills and create an engaging and nurturing school environment. We have brought the school together for larger events, such as our town hall meetings where students of all ages get to be part of school community building and learning around key skills. Students have also taken part in Read Across America Day with students from Valley Regional coming to read to our classrooms to celebrate reading. Coming up we have a number of events between our annual Day of the Arts, Science Fair, spring celebrations for grade 6 as they prepare to move up to the Middle School and our annual Walk-a-Thon.

Staff in many grade levels and content areas took the time to highlight recent events in their classrooms below.

The kindergarten students continue to develop their social skills by exploring the Choose Love topics of gratitude and forgiveness through discussions, stories, and written responses. The students have been introduced to all the letters and sounds at this point in the year. Students are enjoying many books through read-alouds and they are reading fiction and non-fiction books at their own level during the reading workshop. The mini lessons for the workshop have focused on "Reading Super Powers" which are the many strategies students can use to decode words (For example: pointer power, sight word power, sound power, and persistence power). The kindergarten students are looking forward to a "Super Reader Parade" where they will walk by the older students with their capes and superpower signs. This trimester, Writers Workshop is focusing on informational writing. Our second science unit focused on learning about the concepts of push and pull. We learned that swings, slides, car ramps, and kicking balls are all examples of this concept. During Math Workshop, our students are focusing on learning how to identify as well as describe the attributes of two-dimensional shapes. Students are seeing these shapes in their everyday lives, solving puzzles such as tangrams and pattern block puzzles, as well as learning how to draw each shape. Our three-dimensional shape unit will begin next week which will focus on STEM activities such as building cubes, rectangular prisms, and cylinders. Kindergarten students are actively participating in all our activities and are looking forward to spring!

In first grade the staff and students recently celebrated. They decided to have Penguin Day as a culminating celebration for their recent math unit in Bridges which focused on

penguins. Students learned all about King and Rockhopper penguins - where they live, what they look like, what the eat, how many eggs they lay, how much they weigh, and how tall they are. Students then measured and compared the heights of the two penguins to the height of themselves. They wrote inequality statements using the > (greater than) and < (less than) symbols, ordered the three heights from shortest to tallest, and made a life-sized representation of all of the actual heights using yarn. When the math activities were all completed, they just didn't want the fun and learning to end!!!!

Second graders have been very busy! In math, they recently finished their unit which focused on measurement. They have just begun working with place value to 1,000. Students continue to focus on math fact fluency in Number Corner. In reading and writing the students have shifted to Opinion and Characters. They had an author study focusing on Kevin Henkes books. A few examples of these books are Wemberly Worried, Lily and her Purple, Plastic Purse and Chrysanthemum. These books are filled with rich characters, which led to great discussions. The culmination of this unit will be choosing a favorite Mouse character and writing why this is a favorite character, using character traits and evidence from the book.

Also, grade 2 partnered up with grade 4 to co-host the most recent Town Meeting. This focused on the Choose Love theme of Forgiveness. The second graders were responsible for the introduction and conclusion of the meeting. In addition, they learned a Forgiveness Chant and participated in presenting it to the school!

Third grade continues to work to identify and apply all four Choose Love ingredients: Courage, Gratitude, Forgiveness, and Compassion in Action. Social and Emotional Learning takes place each and every day among all content areas. Third graders continue to learn to celebrate their "glorious mistakes," and that making mistakes is how we learn and show that we are taking responsible risks. Students continue to write in their Choose Love and Habits of Mind journals each month, and recently shared how they have used the Habit of Mind, "Thinking Flexibly," to try a different way of thinking. During the last few months, third graders have learned about diverse individuals in history who have contributed to our global world through their courage and perseverance. Through learning about these famous people in history, students have learned that they themselves can also do hard things.

Deep River Elementary School, cont

Students in grade 4 are focusing on multi digit place value, addition, subtraction, and rounding strategies. They are practicing their skills during whole group instruction, small group work, on IXL, and independently. Through Bridges Number Corner students are computing and making mathematical observations and identifying patterns. During writing, students have been learning the writing structure of opinion essays. They are also working on differentiating between facts and opinions. Students have been using Lucy Calkins Boxes and Bullets strategies to elaborate and add details to their writing. Students are using reading comprehension strategies to answer questions using evidence from the text. They are also applying known patterns for accurate spelling. Additionally, students are reading books independently to increase their fluency and reading comprehension strategies such as inferences, point of view, and theme. The 4th graders are learning about Connecticut's geography and first people. 4th graders have just hosted a Town Meeting focusing on the theme Forgiveness where they successfully demonstrated a learned Forgiveness Chant for all of DRES.

In fifth grade, the students have incorporated cross-curricular inquiry to foster deep learning. The students work through the phases of immersion, investigation, coalescence and demonstration of learning. Throughout these phases the students are able to wonder, build background knowledge, develop questions, search for new information, synthesize information, demonstrate an understanding and share their new learning with others. Throughout inquiry, the students tie everything together through an essential question which helps them probe for deeper meaning. These questions are open-ended, encourage collaboration and foster the development of critical thinking skills.

In sixth grade, students are busy getting ready for their transition to middle school. They have already started picking their classes and learning all about what the middle school has to offer. Although the transition seems to be right around the corner, they are getting excited about all the fun activities planned to celebrate our 6th graders and their journey at DRES before they leave us. A few of the activities planned are: a Yard Goats baseball game, a Project O field trip, an ice cream truck and more! In social studies, the students have wrapped up the study of the United States and Canada with a closer look at National Parks. Currently, they are studying Latin America and all the diversity it offers in culture, climate, vegetation and language.

In the music department students are hard at work learning to read and demonstrate the beat values of the basic rhythm notes: whole, half, quarter, and eighths. During the past two weeks the students have had to be on their toes when presented with various rhythms. Using the floor tiles as a "beat," when shown a rhythm, students quickly identify the number of beats and move across the floor the same number of steps. To make the game even more challenging, if the rhythm is green they move forward and if red, backwards. The students are highly engaged and are learning note values while having a ball. Feel free to try the game at home!

Using the four music domains—Create, Perform, Respond, and Connect—the general music classroom can promote collaboration and communication between students, as well as provide frequent opportunities to build relationships and engage with one another. This is particularly true of ensembles that perform with one another. In 5th and 6th grade, they spend much of the year creating an Orff ensemble using the orff xylophones. Students work alone, with a partner and in small groups mastering various musical genres; this year a focus has been on Funk. The interpersonal skills learned in the music classroom can prepare students for future life experiences. These classroom experiences often build a student's confidence to work on other ensembles that happen outside of the regular classroom such as guitar, ukulele and recorder ensemble.

Instrumental Music at DRES is thriving and showing year to year growth in numbers and student interest. We are near 100% enrollment for students in grade 4 & 5. There is an increase in the 6th grade participation from last year as well. Students in grade 3-6 attended a concert at Leamy Hall where they saw the United States Coast Guard Band perform. For many students this was their first live professional performance. Students display a high level of excitement for instrumental music. Our beginning students in 4th grade, are excelling in many areas of learning an instrument which include tone development, rhythm, phrasing, and continually increasing their range of notes and repertoire of music weekly. Some students are advancing so quickly that they are on to Book 2 which typically does not happen until 6th grade. The Advanced Band (5th & 6th Grade) successfully performed at the winter concert. The concert was well attended by families and members of our school's community (the gym was full, standing room only!) Students are working hard on new concert music for the spring concert and continue to develop their skills in ensemble music making. In addition to the Advanced band, students in the 4th grade Beginning Band will perform an ensemble for the first time this spring. In the coming weeks the DRES Jazz Club will begin which will provide students with unique opportunities to continually develop their individual musicianship.

musical instruments, courtyard picnic tables, and other educational items. We have also paid transportation expenses for field trips, science assemblies, and other in school assemblies. Due to the pandemic, we were unable to do most of our fundraising last year. This school year we will be raising money to improve and supplement the outdoor learning spaces that have become so important to our school community during the pandemic.

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


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
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Deep River 60 Club
