Reflections and thank yous...

It has been the honor of a lifetime, and a true privilege to represent Deep River since April of 2016. I will be forever grateful for the opportunity, forever proud of the accomplishments, and forever changed for the better from the experience.

From the moment I heard that Dick had passed it was clear that each and every member of the Deep River "Family" of employees made certain that I knew that they were poised to assist in ensuring that the Town was secure. In my first Newsletter message I spoke of how government stops for nothing, and how the day to day business must continue uninterrupted. Our Town Staff immediately stepped to the fore and made certain that despite the emotional blow, Deep River business did not miss a beat. I can tell you without hesitation that Deep River is fortunate to have such a remarkable staff not only in the Town Hall but in Public Works, as well. It has been a pleasure to work with each of them individually and as a team, they truly care about our town and work tirelessly to make it better.

From our first days with Dave Oliveria, through the addition of Duane Gates to the Board of Selectmen, and finally with the addition of Jim Olson, we have worked only with the best interests of Deep River and her residents in mind. I often remind myself, and others, that the First Selectman alone has very little real authority, and can and should do little more than manage the Town and provide a vision, but with a good Board of Selectmen, good Boards and Commissions, great staff, and finally the approval of the residents, wonderful work can be done.

Dave was a good, level headed Selectman and the right person at the right time. His cooperation and efforts in bringing Duane to the Board were a shining example of how our boards and commissions operate, with only the good of the Town in mind. Duane has been a partner through practically all of the almost eight years, a pleasure to work with, and an example of how partners can disagree on some things, but still work cooperatively to find common ground, with those efforts often leading to better solutions. The addition of Jim to the Board came at just the right time and we benefitted from his continued efforts to approach issues from all sides. Both Duane and Jim brought their lifetime of history in Deep River to their jobs, and that perspective has been invaluable.

I was lucky enough to come into office at nearly the same time that Bud Eckenroth became chair of the Board of Finance. Deep River is extremely fortunate that this man continues to put his efforts forward for the Town, and boy howdy, did I enjoy learning from, and working with the professor.

While I am most proud of the successful efforts made to replenish our Reserve Fund, some of the projects that I am most happy to have been able to work on are the upgrading of the energy efficiency in all of our municipal buildings, the addition of two fire trucks to the roster, the addition of two dump/plow trucks and a police vehicle to our fleet, the rebuilding of our Police Department, the approval of a solar array on the grounds of our Highway Department, the replacement/addition to the playground equipment at DRES, Devitt, and Plattwood Park, and the replacement/addition of the facilities and pavilion at Plattwood Park.

Highways and infrastructure...and important Main Street News

The Connecticut Department of Transportation is replacing the stop light support structure, traffic lights, and cross light stands and mechanisms that control traffic at the intersection of Main Street, Elm Street, and River Street. In the end this project will increase traffic safety and will be a good project for the Town, but the period of construction will be, at the least, a pain in the neck. Work was expected to begin on or around October 1, 2023 but has been delayed until the Spring of next year. This work will be done in six or seven "mobilizations" of approximately 3 – 7 days, with lengthy intervals of no work being done. We have proposed a revision to the work plan to the State in an attempt to reduce the impact to our downtown as much as possible and will work closely with DOT in an attempt to bring that to fruition. Once scheduled we will let you know when the mobilizations will occur and what impact they might have on traffic. Please see below for instructions on signing up for email news blasts.

News from the Selectman's Office, cont.

We have completed paving projects on West Elm Street and Rattling Valley Roads and Kelsey Hill Road has been chip sealed in our efforts to extend the life of our roads. By the time this issue goes to press we should have completed paving of sections of River Road, Meadow Woods, Riverview, Bushy Hill, and Union Street. If we miss them this season, we will get them first thing in the Spring. We will notify you as the schedule becomes clear.

The Town voted unanimously at a Town Meeting in September to replace our 30 year old street sweeper and to purchase a wood chipper to assist in clearing brush or fallen trees from our roads. Both have been ordered from the manufacturer and I expect we will have our chipper in hand soon, while the sweeper will be at least a year being built.

You say goodbye and I say hello...

After many years as our Accounts Manager Cathy Kehlenbach has resigned her position and we thank her for her service to the Town and wish her and her family only good things.

Matt Ward has been Cathy's assistant for a year and a half, but he made the decision to change careers and leave us for a full time role with MahoneySabol. That said, Matt's presence in the absence of Cathy has proved invaluable, and is much appreciated.

We welcome Vicki Galimitakis as our new Accounts Assistant and Annmarie Ryan as our new Finance Director.

We have also added Tina Accetta to the Deep River Town Hall Family as an Adminstrative Assistant in the Selectman's office. Stop in to say hello, she is looking forward to meeting you.

The future of Trash in Deep River...

We are coming to the end of our food scrap grant and toward that end we have created an Ad Hoc Waste Reduction Advisory Committee. After the first public education meeting held at the Town Hall Auditorium we added three new members of the public to the committee and they are working overtime with CT DEEP and our consultants, Waste Zero, to plan how Deep River moves forward with reducing our waste. When you read this there will already have been another information session and I anticipate that there will be a Town Meeting in December to vote on how to proceed. As of this writing the option most discussed is a pay as you throw (PAYT) program similar to Portland or Stonington. Details can be found at the Sustainable Deep River page.

This is really an opportunity for Deep River to continue to lead the way into how Connecticut reduces the amount of garbage being shipped out of our state to landfills in Pennsylvania or Ohio. This is not a sustainable program which will only become more expensive as landfills across the country continue to close.

Final words....

I am perplexed by how to recognize the two women in Town Hall with whom I worked most closely, Gina Sopneski and Joyce Berardis. I have thanked them both personally, but they deserve so much more. Gina really introduced me to the intricacies of the office and what I might expect from the public. We worked together to ensure that Deep River didn't lose a step, and even more closely when COVID 19 arrived. When Gina left, Joyce stepped seamlessly into a seat that had been occupied by someone almost as entrenched as Dick. She learned the role immediately and became my right hand in the Town Hall and beyond, establishing relationships with Local, Regional, State, and Federal offices that have benefitted our town immensely. We are a better Town Hall with Joyce, in her seat, and I will miss working with her on day to day work, Emergency Operations, grant applications, messaging with the community, and beyond.

Last minute addition!! Last spring Joyce and our resident trooper Steve Krause developed and submitted a grant application to the US Department of Justice offices of community oriented policing services. This grant is specific to assisting communities better comply with the new accreditation laws and requirements. Just yesterday we were informed that Deep River had been awarded \$160,000 through the Federal Police Accreditation Grant to further our efforts in not only complying but advancing our police department for the next two years. Great job Joyce and Steve!!!

Back in the Autumn of 2016 I wrote the following about Deep River and how we move forward:

Historically, and rightfully, Deep River was known as the "Queen of the Valley." Her inhabitants embraced the title, bestowing it on their baseball team: the Queens. Whatever role geography and geology may have played in her success, it has always been the people, not the ground beneath, who have been the authors of Deep River's history. Established patterns of conduct, especially when strengthened by the passing years, are not easily changed. Despite the emotional setback, we have not lost our compass, we have maintained our civility, and as we have in the past, we will move forward together, as a community, to set our future course.

I have thoroughly enjoyed my time as your First Selectman, and thank you for the opportunity. I promise you that every decision I made was made with the best of intentions and were what I truly believed to be in the best interest of the Town.

If you don't see a Board or Commission you are interested in, call the Town Clerk at 860-526-6024 to have it added to email options.

Permanent Absentee Ballot

Do you find it difficult to vote at the polls due to your permanent physical disability? Public Act No. 12-57 created permanent absentee balloting status for certain individuals. To be eligible for permanent absentee ballot status, an elector must file with the Town Clerk an absentee ballot application together with a doctor's certificate stating that they have a permanent disability and are unable to appear in person at their polling place. The doctor's note should be on letterhead. There is no prescribed form-the doctor's note and the absentee ballot application would satisfy the requirement of the law. Permanent absentee ballot status enables the elector to automatically be mailed an absentee ballot for each election, primary, and referendum in the municipality in which they are eligible to vote without having to apply each time. Deep River Registrars of Voters

Greetings from the Deep River Registrars of Voters, Elizabeth (Lori) Gregan and Michael Harris. Lori is in her seventh year as Registrar, and this is Michael's first year. Both were elected in the fall of 2022 as write-in candidates - don't forget to ask about your write-in options whenever voting! As such, like all Registrars, they represent all voters in town.

Registrars of Voters are governed by the Connecticut General Statutes, and are sworn elected officials serving twoyear terms. The Registrars of Voters are responsible for:

- Maintaining and updating voter registration information including changes of address, name, or party affiliation, adding new voters and removing voters who are deceased or who no longer reside in town.
- Training election workers. Poll workers are trained before every election. We need you! Volunteer to be a poll worker.
- Preparing election equipment and tabulators and ordering ballots for each election, primary or referendum.
- Conducting an annual canvass, January through May, of voters who may have moved within town, out of town or out of state.
- Implementing new election laws as adopted by Connecticut.
- Conducting High School voter registration sessions.
- Attending Registrars of Voters Association meetings and training.

Their mission is simple, free and fair elections with access for all registered voters. They ensure federal, state, and local elections are conducted timely, responsibly, and with the highest level of professional election standards.

On Wednesday, October 25, 2023, Deep River received an award from the Secretary of the State for having the highest percentage of voter turnout per population of Connecticut small towns in November of 2022! A hearty congratulations and thank you goes out to all Deep River voters. Keep up the good work. The Registrars also want to be very clear about our gratitude for the work of all poll workers and the certified Moderators that keep election polls running smoothly and effectively.

Finally, we congratulate the new slate of town leadership recently elected and wish them well in their work! Life in Deep River is awesome and our future as a wonderful place to live is secure.

Assessor's Office

Programs & Application Filing Dates:

State of Connecticut Homeowner's and Town of Deep River Senior Abatement Program:

The application period for this program begins February 1, 2024, and ends May 15, 2024. If you are considering filing for the abatement program, please note there are several requirements such as persons who file must be 65 years of age by December 31, 2023, or totally disabled and you must meet State income requirements. If you are currently on this program and it is your year to reapply, our office will mail you a reminder letter in January letting you know it is time to see us again!

When applying for this program you will need to bring proof of income with the application. Income includes all taxable and non-taxable income as well as your social security income. To view the current 'Qualifying Income' levels, please visit the Town website at www.deepriverct. us – Assessor's Section.

Exemption forms for **Totally Disabled** persons and the **Blind** are also available online or in the Assessor's Office; you would need to file on or before **October 1, 2024**, to be considered for the **2024** Grand List.

Additional Veterans Program:

The Application period for this program begins February 1, 2024, and runs through October 1, 2024. The Additional Veterans program also mandated income requirements which are listed on the Town website.

Address Changes:

It is important that you report any mailing address changes for your **Real Estate or Personal Property** accounts to **EITHER** the Assessor's or Tax Collector's Office. This will ensure that our records are updated with the most current mailing address and that you are receiving all proper notifications. Please check your property record card on the Town website www.deepriverct.us – Quick Links (Property Assessment Online) or call the Assessor's Office to ensure we have the proper mailing address. **Motor Vehicle** address changes can only be made through the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV).

Motor Vehicle Supplemental Assessments:

Assessment for newly acquired Motor Vehicles registered October 2, 2022, through September 30, 2023 or registration renewals that were not included on the Motor Vehicle **Regular** List, will be sent out in late December 2023. If you have any questions regarding a Supplemental bill you may receive, or you believe you may be entitled to a credit based on the vehicle being sold, totaled, or registered in another state, contact our office to discuss the necessary documentation for possible adjustments.

Thin Plastic and Film Recycling

"Recycle More Than the Bag!"

What are thin plastics?

They are so much more than the bag. Many, many products come wrapped, protected, and delivered in thin plastics. Plastic films labeled with #2 or #4 recycling symbol (polyethylene films), bread bags, Ziploc and other resealable food storage bags, dry cleaning bags, newspaper sleeves, product wrap (around items like paper towels, toilet paper and water bottles), air pillows & bubble wrap, retail bags, plastic shipping envelopes, ice bags, bubble wrap, produce bags and more!

Please **don't** include saran or plastic pouches from meat packaging (think hot dogs or bacon), any soiled and wet bags or wrap. Snack bags, candy wrappers and frozen food bags are also don'ts.

Please do be sure your plastics are CLEAN and DRY.

Food Scraps

Food scraps make up 20% of the waste we currently throw away and can easily be converted to energy and compost right here in Connecticut. Deep River is recognized statewide as a leader in the food scrap diversion movement. DEEP Commissioner Katie Dykes was recently heard at the capitol giving our community a big shout-out as a "model for how towns can handle local compostable waste."

Many thanks to those people who are separating and disposing of their food scraps in an environmentally friendly way. Disposal can be in your backyard compost, handed off to the chickens next door or at the Deep River Transfer Station. Whatever environmentally friendly way you do it, we applaud you. Pay-As-You-Throw

Several of our members are on the Deep River Waste Reduction Committee working with DEEP and Waste Zero to formulate a good plan for reducing waste at the Deep River Transfer Station. They have held two town-wide information sessions to discuss how paying for household waste bags can have a positive effect on encouraging people to reduce their waste and recycle effectively. This method is commonly referred to as pay-as-you-throw or UBP (unit-based pricing).

Please come out to the Public Meeting on or about December 11th at which time a vote will be taken to adopt a pay-as-you-throw plan.

Tri-Town Sustainable Efforts

We are pleased to be collaborating with the Sustainable Essex and Chester committees to more effectively and efficiently bring sustainable practices to our Tri-town area. Both Essex and Chester are certified Silver. We are working towards earning Silver next Spring!

This Fall we have been working together on:

- Region 4 Schools Food Scraps implementation.
- A FREE Three Part "Stop the Plastic" series which included: a book talk at the Essex Library by Erica Cirino, author of "Thicker Than Water: The Quest for Solutions to the Plastic Crisis," a Sustainability Roundtable discussion at The Hive in Chester, and a Climate, Coffee and Conversations event at The Nest with House State Representative Christine Palm.

Deep River Parks and Recreation

As we head into the fall and winter, Deep River Parks and Recreation is excited to bring back some of our popular programming.

Our adult pickleball league has started. The first session that began in mid-October is full but the next session, which begins in early January is taking registrations. Sessions are limited to 20 players. Pickleball is played on Monday evenings from 6:00-8:00pm at Deep River Elementary School. The cost for session 2 is \$35.00 payable at the time of registration. Session 2 will run from early January through early April.

Parks and Recreation will once again offer winter basketball for youth in grades K-12. At this time, we are trying to secure gym space for the older players due to the loss of the JW gymnasium space. However, registration is now open on-line. We need volunteer coaches to make the program run. Please consider coaching. If you are hesitant because you have little or no experience, we can offer on-line training classes or set up a training session with some of our more experienced coaches. Maybe you hesitate because you travel for work? Well, pair up with another parent to coach so that you can share the workload. Volunteers make this program happen! Please remember that dogs are allowed in the parks from November 1st through March 8th but must be leashed or under control at all times. Dogs are not allowed on the beach or on the ballfields.

No household trash should be disposed of at the parks.

Friendly reminder- Park use forms are required to be filled out by residents and non-residents if you would like to reserve exclusive use of a park area. Plan ahead as your application may have to be presented to the full Commission for a vote. A refundable security deposit is required of all users. Insurance might also be required.

We continue to experience vandalism at the parks, so please help us by being the eyes and ears when you are out enjoying these lovely town assets. Often times, vandalism is done by non- residents. So, if you see something, please report it immediately so that we can take action to resolve it in a timely manner. Thank you.



Community Health Committee

The Community Health Committee (CHC) wants to thank everyone who stopped by Adams Hometown Market to donate food items or cash at the annual 'Stuff- a- Cruiser' food drive event held on November 5th. Thank you to the Deep River Police Department, who were on site collecting and transporting the food back to the food pantry. The cruiser was 'stuffed' over 5 times! The food collected stays in the community and helps to provide our most vulnerable Deep River residents with food for a holiday dinner as well as yearround food assistance. The Deep River food pantry is located at 56 High Street, and is open on Tuesdays from 9:00-12:00pm and on Thursdays from 1:00-4:00 pm or by appointment. Non-perishable food donations may be made at any time by leaving donations in the drop box located in the lobby of the building. Perishable items can be accepted in small quantities when the pantry is open. Currently we have 1 small refrigerator available for storage.

Due to inflation and the rising cost of home heating fuel, some of our neighbors are facing hardships as they try to make ends meet. The CHC, to help offset their burden, has initiated our annual community appeal. The annual appeal letter mailed to all postal customers in Deep River is reaping generous returns. Our goal for 2023 is \$9500.00. To date, we have collected over \$7400.00 for the Community Health Fund (CHF), so we are well on our way. Thank you to all who have given so generously to this cause. If you haven't yet mailed your donation, there is still time. Please consider donating; remember no amount is too small. All funds collected are used to help Deep River families. The CHC would like to thank Deep River's own Face Arts Music for their very large donation of food items and gift cards recently collected at an event that they



organize and hold every year. Face Arts Music held their annual 'Jams For Cans' event on Saturday, November 11th. This event is in its 18th year! Jams for Cans is a night of live music, all genres- rock, blues, jazz, folk, with the sole purpose of stocking the Deep River Pantry's shelves. Local bands and musicians are featured. It was held at the Deep River Ambulance Barn from 3-10 pm. Admission to this awesome night was 10 non-perishable items per person or a food gift card of \$25.00 or more.

We want to thank our community partners who help out the food pantry and our social service director throughout the year. Local civic groups such as the Rotary Club, the Elks, the Deep River Fire Department and local churches in Deep River and Chester are important contributors!

The committee also administers the Backpack program for students at Deep River Elementary School. Working with the school's social worker, Laura Kasprow, this program ensures that students who might otherwise

face food insecurity on the weekends do not go without. Members of the committee take turns going shopping for food items, assembling bags and having them ready for distribution on Friday mornings. It is a wonderful program but a great deal of work for a small committee to take on alone. So, a big thank you to other groups that have helped out when asked- namely the Deep River Rotary Club and the Town Hall employees. We could use more help, so if you would like to volunteer to shop for this great cause or help assemble bags each week, please reach out to a committee member or call and leave a message for the CHC through the Selectman's office. If you'd like to donate specifically to this program, any school lunch type snacks, or easy to prepare dinner options are welcome. Donations can be marked for the backpack program and dropped at the food pantry. Currently we are serving 12 students at DRES.

Another great source of funding is the 'community match fund' through Liberty Bank. Each fall, money is collected from jars put out in the bank lobby and then the total of those funds is matched by Liberty Bank. The food pantry is available free to any Deep River resident in need. If you need other assistance, please make an appointment to meet with Rosie. Her phone number is 860-526-6033.

If you are looking for ways to help, donations are always sought and appreciated. Items can be dropped off in the lobby of the Tri-Town building @ 56 High Street or at Town Hall during office hours. You may also order items online and have them shipped directly to the pantry if that is easier. Gift cards are also appreciated.

As we move into the colder months, the pantry is in need the following food items:

- Hearty soups/stews
- Juice
- Coffee/tea (small 1 lb. containers)
- Canned fruit
- Boxed or shelf milk
- Cereal/oatmeal

- Perishables during office hours ONLY, such as milk, eggs and butter



Deep River Land Trust

What's new with the Deep River Land Trust

The properties managed by the Deep River Land Trust provide a welcome respite from the stress and hurried pace of our busy lives. It's possible to venture out onto trails overlooking the Connecticut River or to spend time in more forested environs. Whichever Land Trust property you choose to access there will be a reward around every bend in the trail. Each season will bring a different view from exactly the same spot. Now, how many of us can say that about a walk in a city or a stroll down a busy thoroughfare? The members of the Land Trust work to preserve critical habitats necessary for the protection of native plants, animals, amphibians, avians and reptiles.

At any given time, the Land Trust volunteers can be found clearing out invasive plants, cleaning debris off of established trails, picking up litter from roadsides adjacent to our properties, leading bird walks and building a hardscape to make an area more accessible. During the course of the last year there have been a number of exciting events in the world of the Deep River Land Trust. In the spring of this year, we had our first maple syrup harvest at the Guetliweg property. This project was supported by the Bushy Hill Nature Center which kindly let us use their sugar shack. This event will be reprised next spring, and we encourage the public to drop by on selected dates which will be posted on social media. We had a contingent of students from the high school volunteer through the Warriors in the Community program to help with the maintenance of trails and build a deer exclosure structure at Guetliweg. The Rattling Ridge and Ridge Bypass Trails were opened in September with a hike and an after-hike party at High Nine. A dedicated group of volunteers are working with the Town of Deep River to acquire property on Rattling Valley Road which will be designated as open space. A new viewing platform is being constructed at the Smythe property which will offer a clear line of sight for bird watching and a spot for contemplation.

Since its founding in 1975 the Land Trust has acquired and preserves more than 230 acres of land in Deep River. There are a number of geographic features representative of the forces of nature which have given us our unique landscape. Chief among these are the glaciers which have come and gone over millennia. There are interesting environmental gems located on a number of our 15 properties, including beaver ponds, vernal pools, cold water streams and tracts of undisturbed woodlands. All of these features help to support wildlife, sequester carbon and filter our community's water as it moves toward the Connecticut River. The next time you have the opportunity to stroll or hike on one of the trails on the Land Trust properties give a nod to the intrepid trail crew who work from spring through the fall to keep the trails clear and plan for the next iteration of trail construction. Leading this stalwart group of individuals is Robert Butterworth. Rob has been involved in trail work since 2001 when he began volunteering with the CT Forest and Park Association managing a section of hiking trail in the Cockaponset state forest. He was asked to take over the entire trail in 2003 as the person who preceded him moved out of state. Rob has continued to manage the trail but has the help of three other individuals helping with the maintenance of the trail. In addition to working fulltime, managing the trails at Cockaponset, and raising a puppy (which is super cute) Rob has also spent time learning to build sustainable trails. He has spent years learning to build trails and has imparted his expertise to the volunteers who work with him on the Land Trust properties. When I talked with Rob about the concept of building trails, he presented a lesson in physics and a view of the natural world that lines up with Claude Monet. Rob patiently explained the concept of how physics is related to the mass and energy of water as it moves down hill and the need to work with the force of water when building trails. He then explained how he spends a full year deciding where a trail should be built by observing the view from "positive control points" on a proposed trail. Rob described how a view in mid summer can be dramatically different from the same spot in the depths of winter. This concept is similar to what Monet did in his paintings, where he painted the same scene over the course of time with the repetitious study of a scene at different times of day, showing the effects of sunlight, time and weather on a subject. I'm sure Rob would not see himself as the Monet of sustainable trails, but it does illustrate the idea of a shared appreciation of beauty. When asked about what the greatest need he has as our master trail manager/builder, Rob said a multi year commitment from volunteers, because it takes time to learn the craft and art of building sustainable trails. Planning & Zoning

Thanks to a COVID-era grant from the State of Connecticut, the Town of Deep River has been gradually expanding its government services that can be accessed without making a trip to Town Hall. One of the primary beneficiaries of these long-overdue upgrades is the Land Use Office, which includes the Building Department, Planning & Zoning, and Inland Wetlands. Because this office is generally only open two days per week, property owners, contractors, and interested buyers or builders often have to modify their schedules to accommodate that limited availability. Over the next 6-12 months, that resource will be dramatically improved, because of two significant new developments.

The first of these is already in place. The Town has digitized its basic property information through an online Geographic Information Systems (GIS) website. That site - www.axisgis.com/deep_riverct/ contains a wealth of information about property parcels and underlying data. While this may surprise traditional map-users who have a limerence for old-school cartographers, the GIS website can easily and quickly answer many questions like: How many acres is this property? Are there likely wetlands on site? Are there public sewer lines nearby? What are the allowable uses in this zone? When was the primary building constructed, and when was it last sold? It is hoped that the ready access to this information will help property owners, realtors, developers, and curious visitors access a wealth of information without having to wait for the Land Use Office to be open.



The second significant technology upgrade has the potential to be even more transformative of how people interact with Deep River's government. The Town recently entered into a contract with Brightly Software, the makers of the SmartGov permitting system, to begin to migrate Deep River's land use permitting (building, zoning, wetlands, and health) to an online format. The initial framework of this system will be over the next several months, with a target of full implementation within the year. The software will allow property owners and building contractors to submit their entire project application package online, including maps, plan sets, and payments. This can be done 24/7, so that applicants do not need to wait for those windows of time when the Land Use Office is open to physically deliver applications and plans to Town Hall. Even more importantly, it will allow town officials to more efficiently review, track, comment on, and approve permits at any time.



The migration of permitting systems to a digital format will take some time and effort and will present a significant learning curve for town staff, property owners, and contractors alike. In the end, however, the Town believes that this is a more responsive, accessible, and efficient way to deliver critical government services to its residents. 
Fall was a busy season in the life of the church.

Dry Pants Model Yacht Club

Exciting and fun to watch or sail the Dry Pants Model Yacht Club (DPMYC) is finishing up its Fall Series this week, ending eight weeks of Sunday competition. The DPMYC is a 31-member group of radio-controlled model boat sailors. We sail most every Wednesday and Sunday from 10:30am to 1:30pm, unless the Plattwood Pond is frozen, or the temperature is below 38 degrees.

There are three One Design classes sailed. The CR-914 is the most popular. In fact, the DPMYC has the largest CR fleet in the country. The other two classes are the DF-95 and DF-65. CR-914s are 3 feet long and 5 feet tall including the keel bulb. With a fair wind, both the CRs and DFs race at 4-5 mph, a fast walk and turn on a dime. If you can toggle, you can sail all classes. Your right thumb steers while your left thumb adjusts both the main and jib, together.

The Club is a good source for used boats, especially the CR-914 which is a good boat for the new skipper. Some skippers enjoy building their own boats from kits, others prefer to buy used boats. There are loaner boats for those who just want to get their feet wet.

Radio controlled racing is like big boat racing, with the same rules. The start is very important, then boat speed and tactics take over. Some skippers will fine tune their rigging between races, some tweaks are helpful, others regrettable. If you finish poorly, don't worry, there will be another race in a few minutes.

Trophies or plaques are awarded to the top three finishers in both the Spring and Fall Series. The balance of the racing year is just for fun and camaraderie. We meet at the Deep River Ambulance Barn at 1:30pm on the second and fourth Tuesday of the month September through November and February through May.




