



Honoring the Elephant



On the Backs of Elephants

"The Ivory Trade," the historic marker displayed at Landing & Main Restaurant (Main and Kirtland Streets), offers the briefest of Deep River histories, spanning the Industrial Age—from the mid 18th Century through the end of World War II. It speaks of ivory, but does not mention the toll on the elephants themselves. Nor is there mention of the depredations suffered by enslaved Africans, forced by their captors to lug the huge tusks across their shoulders from Zanzibar in the east, across the continent to west coast ports. Their tusks represented just a tiny fraction of the mass of each elephant, yet the animals themselves represented what today might be called "collateral damage," slaughtered for no other reason than the value of their ivory. But while the slaves who bore their burdens might at least entertain the concept of rising up against their masters, the elephants could not.

Accounts of the numbers of elephants killed for no purpose other than to satisfy the market for piano keys vary. Some sources say that as many as 12,000 elephants a year gave their lives solely for their tusks. A History of Pratt Read Company, published in 1973 by the Deep River Historical Society, cites an earlier publication—Ivory, Scourge of Africa, by E. D. Moore, who wrote that "approximately 30,000 elephants were killed from 1905 to 1912." Whatever the exact number, the toll on the east African elephant population was devastating.

Ivory was by no means Deep River's only industry, but it is fair to say that, for the better part of two centuries, ivory sustained us. Our commercial area in those days was centered more toward Pratt Read and the north end of town. Main Street was a link in the Middlesex Turnpike, the heavily-traveled route from Old Saybrook to Middletown, Hartford and points north.

Piano keys are no longer veneered in ivory, and the ivory trade has been banned world-wide since 1990. Africa's overall elephant population is estimated at 600,000, but in eastern regions of Chad, poaching for the sale of tusks on the black market, reduced elephant numbers from 400,000 in 1970 to fewer than 10,000 by 2006, according to Wikipedia. But it is not simply a matter of catching the poachers. Like wild creatures throughout the world, elephants suffer from encroachment. As human populations expand, forests and other formerly wild habitats give way to housing and agriculture.

In recent years respect for the natural world has begun to work its way more deeply into our consciousness. We have come to understand that although we cannot control the forces of nature, neither can the natural world continue to absorb the pressures of our presence. There may be limits to our ambitions.

Enter the Elephant

Sometime in the mid '00s, John Guy LaPlante, who, himself, may be mistaken for one of nature's forces, conceived the idea of honoring the elephant by bringing one to Deep River, a symbol that would serve as a reminder of the tens of thousands of elephant tusks that, over two centuries, underwrote our town's success. John was an active member of Deep River Rotary. Among his previous causes was the Rotary-funded gazebo at what has come to be known as Keyboard Park. (John LaPlante has other credits, too: a couple of years in the Peace Corps in Eastern Europe and a book or two. But that's another story).

John was on a quest, but purpose or not, his introduction to Ellen was determined by fate—or simple misjudgment. On the way to Rhode Island to visit his Uncle Dennis, John took the wrong turn leaving the Interstate. Was he lost? Depends on your defini-

tion. When he stopped at the end of the exit ramp, facing him from across the road were not one, but five elephants of varying sizes. It was the holy Grail of elephant sculptures.

Thus it was that on the morning of the 3rd of December 2010, John Guy LaPlante and Highway Foreman Ed Field headed east in the Town pickup, en route to Rhode Island. By 2 o'clock, now a trio, the group returned to Town Hall: humans in front, Ellen safely strapped in place, wrapped against the chill in a pink River Wind quilt. The elephant was here.

But where is ...HERE?

A few more, Ellen was hustled off to the Town Garage pending a decision on her final placement. But agreeing on a place for her display was not nearly the hotbutton issue as had been the controversy over whether she should be purchased at all. She was expensive, but aside from the cost, did Rotary's mission include dealing with sensitive issues such as elephants and ivory?

Over time both issues were resolved: Ellen came to Deep River and, eventually, following the consideration of many sites—the Piano Works (somewhat obvious), the Town Landing (pretty much the same), Town Green, Library, Keyboard Park...But of all the possibilities, Town Hall seemed most logical. It made sense that a symbol of Deep River should be at our Town's seat of government. And there was the practical consideration—here, in such a public place, itinerant artists might be less apt to embellish Ellen's wrinkled grayness.

Her proper welcome:

On a gorgeous October 14, 2011, the stage was set. Ceremonies commenced at the Town Landing, with speeches appropriate to the occasion and performances by the Deep River Junior Ancients Drum Corps. Then, the entire congregation having removed to the lawn in front of Town Hall, 'Queenie' was unveiled, and the event concluded with a fife and drum rendition of the "Star Spangled Banner."





All the Dirt Thats Fit to Dig

Live in each season as it passes; breathe the air, drink the drink, taste the fruit, and resign yourself to the influences of each. -1853 journal entry by Henry David Thoreau

The Summer Solstice on June 20th ushered in unusual heat and seasonal blooms happening weeks earlier than normal. In July along came the rain, all of which any gardener would be grateful for, but these climate



changes are influencing the air we breath, the drink we drink and the fruit we eat. What can we do to help? Taking small steps in how we manage our property to help Pollinators is a start. One small but very influential step taken by the Town to save the Monarch Butterfly this year was keeping all the milkweed along Main

Street. Habitat loss and fragmentation has occurred throughout the Monarch range. Milkweed is the only food source for monarch larvae and for caterpillars to eat and lay their eggs on. We have several forms of Milkweed that grow in CT and adding it to your garden or even in a pot on the deck would be an influence you can have on every season that passes.

As members of the CT College Arboretum we had a tour of the Wild Flower Garden and Azalea Collection in May. This 750 acre Arboretum includes landscaped grounds, surrounding plant collections, natural areas and managed landscapes. These resources all support the College's mission of preparing the next generation of citizen leaders, whose diverse responsibilities will include crafting a sustainable relationship with the natural world. A wonderful place to visit any time of the year.

As next generation leaders go, Katherine Morrissey of Deep River was this years recipient of the Deep River Garden Club Helen Hannon Scholarship of \$500. Her interest in Chemistry with a focus on renewable energy and climate change will lead us forward. Our congratulations and best wishes for your continued success.

As continuing education for our members we participated in a lecture at Ballecks Garden Center on Perennials for 10 months of bloom. Thank you Nancy Balleck for providing useful information on plants that offer food for our birds, pollinator plants for all seasons and creating an environment that can bring comfort and consolation in time of distress.

We have planted flowers this year at the Veterans Green, Devitt's Field, The Landing, Town Hall, Plattwood Park and the Winthrop Planter. I want to thank my watering team who help keep everything blooming. Important News and Application Deadlines:

Additional Veteran's Exemption: -The filing period for this program runs from February 1, 2021 through October 1, 2021. To qualify for the Additional Veteran's Exemption, State mandated income requirements must be met.

If you own property and are Totally Disabled & or Blind, you are entitled to an exemption. To receive this exemption, criteria must be met and an application completed on the prescribed form which needs to be filed with our office by October 1, 2021 for the 2021 Grand List.

Income requirements and additional information can be found on the website at www.deepriverct.us or call the Assessor's Office at 860-526-6029. Please contact our office to schedule an appointment if you wish to apply for any of the above programs or if you have any questions regarding the requirements.

Active Members of the U.S. Armed Forces: – Any active member of the United States Armed Forces (defined as United States Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Coast Guard, and Air Force and any reserve component thereof, including the Connecticut National Guard) is eligible for the exemption of one motor vehicle. Applications for the exemption must be completed annually and submitted to the Assessor's Office no later than the December 31st following the date on which property tax is due in the town in which the motor vehicle is registered.

Veterans are reminded to record their Honorable Discharge papers (DD214) with the Town Clerk's office on or before October 1, 2021. Those veterans who have already recorded their DD214 do not need to file again.

Farm or Forest Use Program - New applications are available for property owners claiming land as Farming or Forest use and need to be filed with the Assessor between September 1 and October 31, 2021. A working income bearing farm is necessary to be considered for the Farm Program. To be considered for the Forestry Program, a minimum of 25 acres, not including the home site, is required and property owners must have a certificate from the Forestry Department dated on or before October 1, 2021. Please stop in the Assessor's Office to receive guidelines and applications for both programs.

Tax Exempt Organizations - In accordance with the Connecticut General Statutes, this is the year in which

scientific, education, literary, historical, charitable, open space land preservation organizations, and cemetery property held in trust for a religious organization are required to refile for property tax exemption status. Quadrennial forms (M-3) were mailed by the Assessor's Office on September 1st to existing accounts and are due on or before November 1, 2021.

Town of Deep River Business Owners:

Business Personal Property Declarations – Personal Property Declarations will be mailed mid-September, to all existing accounts. Notice is hereby given to all persons liable to pay Personal Property taxes in the Town of Deep River that they must return to the Assessor's office, on or before the first day of November 2021, their personal property list (declaration). Failure to declare will require the Assessor to apply an arbitrary assessment and a 25% penalty.

Personal property declaration should include all furniture, fixtures, equipment and machinery of all commercial and industrial businesses; *unregistered motor vehicles*, snowmobiles, farm machinery and horses. Manufacturing Machinery Exemption Applications must also be filed at this time. Anyone not receiving a personal property declaration should contact the Assessor's office. Even though a declaration was not received, it does not preclude you from filing. If you are a resident business in the Town of Deep River it is your responsibility according to Connecticut State Statues to file one.

If you have received a personal property declaration and will not be conducting any business in Deep River as of October 1, 2021 you must complete the Affidavit on the front page of the declaration and return it to the Assessor's office prior to November 1, 2021. This signed affidavit is mandatory as proof to allow the Assessor to remove you from the 2021 Grand List. If the documentation is not received, the Assessor must estimate the assessment and apply a 25% penalty.

Veterans Green Monument Committee



Upon removal of the original bricks from the platform of the Columbia, the Committee noticed that many of the bricks had names written on the bottom of the bricks in magic marker. Searching through records of the late Edward Negrelli, the Committee found minutes from October of 1993 which stated that people could sign their names at the bottom of the bricks as a donation to help pay for the platform. Those signed bricks would then be installed on the platform. It took our Committee over 6 months to sort through over 4000 bricks that were taken from the Columbia platform. At the conclusion of our search, we found 371 bricks with names inscribed on the bottom. Of those 371 bricks, we were able to identify 364 names. The Committee, along with the Board of Selectmen, decided that these bricks will need to go back on the platform as they were placed as a donation. The bricks will be placed on the granite walkway which goes around the Columbia platform. The Committee is also considering taking up the rest of the granite slabs on the walkway and around the flag pole and reinstalling them. We are hopeful to have a fundraiser in the beginning of November to pay for the cost of this renovation. Deep River Historical Society Celebrates 75th Anniversary

It has been a huge challenge for us to cope with the social and financial effects of the Pandemic for 18 months. All our fund raisers and programs suffered by cancellations due to the COVID-19 concerns. We are now at a place that we feel we can loosen those strict standards and start resuming some of our activities, at lease as of this month of July, when this article was written.

Ada Southworth Munson gifted the Southworth Homestead to the Saybrook Historical Society (now Deep River) in August of 1946. Three generations have lived in the Stone House. We are so fortunate that we have a place to share that history of Deep River and use the property to maintain her home and make it a showcase for the town's collections. We are thankful to the local businesses that supported us on our 75 Bits of History program during the summer. Please support their businesses: Anchor & Compass, Davinci Pizza, Hally Jo's, Celebrations, Deep River Pizza, The Nest, Compass Rose, Apizza Grande and The Red House.

We are excited about our newest permanent exhibit in the Munson Gallery on our second floor. Due to our first grant from CT Humanities this has enabled us to complete a nearly 4-year project called "WHARF TO WATERFALL" This leads into the changes that

also occurred into the Industrial Revolution and how Deep River had a big part in that. Even if you have visited the Stone House previously, it is time to visit again to see the huge transformation of our display. We are so appreciative of the planning and execution of this amazing display with the help of Brenda

Milkofsky, a professional Museum Consultant, and her involvement for all four years. Many dedicated vol-

unteer hours made this a reality and without them it never would have been accomplished. Stop in and see the changes, you won't be sorry and most likely be very impressed in how our town's history is newly displayed. As a bonus our exhibit on the first floor remains open celebrating our town's history on the 100th Anniversary of Women finally winning the right to vote.

We will close our summer hours on Saturday, September 18th, Family Day. We will be open by appointment until December 3rd. December 3,4 & 5 we will open for our Festival of Trees. Hours to be announced. The suffragette exhibit will close this fall and a brand new exhibit will be opened next spring. Wharf to Waterfall is a long time exhibit and will be enhanced next year.

We also want to acknowledge the funds received from the Community Foundation of Middlesex County to help with making the new exhibit more interactive.

Thoughts are underway for a re-enactment on October 2nd that connects the children's story of Stone Soup with the Stone House to create a fund raiser for the Society.

Early fall we will be sending out a town wide appeal letter, which was done two years ago, with the hope for financial support from Deep River Residents and Businesses. This is separate from our membership letter sent out earlier in the year. We hope that you will help us with our many expenses and maintenance of the grounds and buildings. We are a non-profit organization, and your donations are tax deductible, and greatly appreciated.

We are in the process of repair and redesign of our Historic Bleach House that is damaged and deteriorating. A grant from the 1772 Foundation only partially covers the expenses. The plan is to take it down, create new supports and put a structure overhead of the new design. It is being done in stages as finances allow. Anyone wishing to donate to this purpose can donate to the Society specifically for that purpose.

Winthrop Baptist Church

How does a 276-year-old "country" church survive a pandemic? It turns out that it takes a lot of creativity, an enormous amount of willpower from a dedicated group of Deacons and Trustees, and the love and support of the community.

After shutting our doors on March 15, 2020 due to the rapid spread of COVID-19, Winthrop Baptist Church reopened in September 2020 after welcoming our new interim pastor, Rev. Bill Huegel one month prior. Rev. Huegel joins us from Wallingford following a 35-year career serving three American Baptist churches in both Connecticut and Massachusetts. Upon the Church's reopening, Rev. Huegel, preached from our side porch with the help of technology to create three "new" ways to attend church. Services were broadcast live on Facebook for those uncomfortable returning in-person while our PA system allowed parishioners to sit outside and enjoy the weather, and a new FM transmitter let parishioners remain in their cars and "tune in." As the weather turned colder, however, we returned to our Sanctuary following strict COVID-19 guidelines. Seating capacity was limited as pews were roped off and shared items like hymnals and bibles were removed. Congregants were required to wear masks and hymn singing was not allowed. An extensive weekly cleaning protocol was put in place to keep everyone safe. Services returned to a more "normal" look and feel on Easter Sunday, and we are now fully open with regular Sunday services from 10 to 11 a.m. each week.

Despite the pandemic, we found ways to continue our church mission of community service. We established the Winthrop Baptist Pantry, collecting food items for the local food bank, and began serving free lunches to the community on Tuesdays. Free breakfasts prepared by Rev. Huegel were served on Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday.



We welcomed the community back to the church in a big way on June 5, 2021, hosting our first (and hopefully not last) Tag Sale and Community Market. Our normal September tag sale and Holly Day Christmas Fair had been canceled in 2020, and we sought ways to bring the greater community together as pandemic-related restrictions were



eased. After a year of lockdown, we were excited to invite our neighbors for an outside market where they could visit with one another, share breakfast and lunch, and feel the joy of being together. The Market was a huge success with nearly two dozen booths on a hot and sunny day. Local non-profits, including


the Winthrop Cemetery Association, The Over 60 Club, Deep River Historical Society, American Legion and Auxiliary, Deep River Town Historian, and Boobstock (a breast cancer charity) joined us along with several private vendors. Church proceeds benefitted local church missions like the Deep River Food Pantry, a backpack program, and our soon-to-be launched Community Closet.

Currently, we're hard at work preparing for a special 9/11 community service. More information about that event should begin appearing in the local newspaper soon, so keep an eye out for announcements.

Enhanced safety precautions were put in place to help insure that the P & R youth summer camp could once again offer campers and staff a delightful eight weeks of summer fun! Camp ran from June 21st- through August 13th and at less than \$140.00 a week remains one of the best values around.

The campers enjoyed three days a week of swimming and beach fun at Plattwood Park. Two days were spent at the elementary school, where games, crafts, playground fun and local walking field trips were possible. Several times the campers trekked to the library for super cool and fun programs, such as learning about pond life, being entertained by a magician, and enjoying yoga-storytelling. The campers were also invited on a walk through Fountain Hill Cemetery by Rhonda Forristall, a local historian and volunteer with the DR Historical Society. Rhonda made history 'come alive' for the campers with a very interesting walk where they learned many cool and interesting facts. One of those was why Sol Lewitt's headstone has cube shapes on it and why another displays the Dairy Queen Logo. Her planned 45 minute walk turned into an hour and a half! The campers were enthralled! On another day, the staff and campers had the opportunity to walk to the Stone House where volunteers demonstrated and explained early life in Deep River and how our ancestors used 'gadgets' created out of







necessity, to perform daily tasks. A big thank you to the volunteers at the DR Historical Society; Kathy Schultz, Rhonda Forristall, Richard Kalapos and Jeff and Linda Hostetler, among others, who shared their knowledge and gave of their time to give the campers and staff a fun day.

Parks and Recreation is extremely grateful to the Community Foundation of Middlesex County who awarded the department a \$1,000.00 grant to be used exclusively for youth summer camp. This generous donation allowed 7 Deep River youth to attend camp free of charge. The whole camp got in the spirit sending out a big thank you to the Foundation.

The summer concert series, "Sounds of Summer" was well received but, of course, was derailed three times due to inclement weather. There seems to be something about Thursday evenings in the summer that brings on rain! The lineup of bands was awesome with something for everyone. 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
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Sustainability CT-Deep River Committee

The Deep River Sustainability Committee has been busy! Committee members continue to tackle an array of 'action items' with the goal of helping Deep River move towards becoming a sustainable town.

Lenore Grunko is moving action item 9 forward; Strategic Materials Management, specifically 9.3; Recycle Additional Materials and Compost Organics. Under this action item, a program would be set up to allow Deep River residents to recycle food scraps. This would keep hundreds of pounds of compostable waste from ending up in plastic garbage bags and disposed of as household waste at the town's transfer station. The town would save a substantial amount of money by potentially reducing our garbage by 20-30%. This is our goal since MIRA, the garbage processing facility in Hartford, will be closing next year and our garbage will be transported out of state. The impact of this is twofold, larger costs to the town and more environmental impact. Educating the community on the importance of recycling food scraps will be challenging but as Lenore points out when recycling first went into effect back in the 1970's, it took a while to understand the 'why and how' of the process we're all practicing now. First, we had to recycle cans and bottles and when that didn't work on a large enough scale, folks were paid to return their cans and bottles. Soon after that, other items hit the recycling stream. Now, we need to adopt a new behavior recycling ALL food scraps. This will include, meat, cheese, eggs and vegetables. The food waste will be transported from the transfer station by a hauling company to Quantum Biopower in Southington. Quantum Biopower is an anaerobic digestion facility that turns organic material into renewable energy and compost. The process reduces our garbage, saves money while also saving OUR piece of the planet.

The Board of Selectmen put together a Deep River Transfer Station Advisory Committee which has been meeting regularly to determine the best course of action to move this forward. Because Chester contracts with the town to utilize the transfer station for recycling and bulky waste inviting them to the table makes sense. The committee consists of elected officials from Deep River and Chester as well as Sustainable CT committee members from both towns.

So get ready Deep River peeps! Residents, restaurants, apartment complexes and more we're about to embark on a new age. Stay tuned for the details!

Let's read together! Spearheaded by Lenore Grunko, the Deep River Sustainable CT committee is initiating a Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI) book club in collaboration with the Deep River Library and the Sustainable CT committees in both Essex and Chester. This DEI book club for the tri towns will begin on September 22, 2021 at the Deep River Public Library. By applying a racial equity lens to book readings and discussion, the group will pay attention to race and ethnicity, while analyzing problems, seeking solutions and defining successes. The group will be excited to listen, learn and do the hard work that is required to address the power imbalances that exist as part of systemic racism. While reading and discussing books centered on DEI, we hope to develop a better understanding of the obstacles and options available to us to while creating a more inclusive and comfortable environment for all people. We will be meeting on the 4th Wednesday of each month at 6:30pm. The first book is White Fragility. Send email to TTDEIbookclub@yahoo.com to sign up or for more information.

Committee members Jerry Richard, Jeff Gross and Kevin Clark continue to work on action item 7; Renewable and Efficient Energy Infrastructure and Operations, which requires gathering and tracking energy consumption across all municipal buildings, both electric and gas, and identifying areas of waste and where the use of renewable energy would be beneficial. This includes solar and wind power, (also part of action item 5.0). This is a very time consuming process that involves reaching out to State, local and town personnel as well as Eversource for electric and gas information.

Another action item being addressed is action item 6; Clean and Diverse Transportation Systems and Choices. This covers zero emission vehicles, municipal vehicles and public transportation amongst other things. Where to locate another charging station for example, is being considered.

Committee member Jeff Gross is also working on action item 3.10; Facilitate Invasive Species Education and Management. Working with Alan Miezejeski, the Deep River Tree Warden, plans are in the works to support a volunteer effort to cut down and eradicate invasive species on town property. One particular species, Tree of Heaven, is overrunning several of our streets. Late sum-

mer is good for cutting with less immediate grow-back. As of this writing, a detailed plan is being submitted to the Board of Selectman including the scope of work, the locations of work and dates of work. Alan will aid in technical and legal guidelines, safety advice, and in obtaining any permits necessary for cutting on town property. This volunteer effort is a start to addressing a large problem and at this point, will not include state right-of-ways or private property, where the problem is arguably bigger. The hope is that through personal outreach by the volunteers, the community will be made aware of what invasive species exist in town and in their own yards and can take action. Perhaps as you read this, you have seen this group of volunteers working...please consider joining them in their efforts. Jeff will also reach out to the Conservation Commission and Deep River Garden club to help with these efforts as it is an ongoing battle to stay ahead of these invasive plants.

Jeff is also delving into action item 3.0; Well-stewarded Land and Natural Resources. He is trying to organize a public seminar on the new HB6441 bill, which outlines how towns can establish programs favoring resiliency in the face of climate change. The bill as passed seems to focus on storm water runoff which is relevant to all of the Connecticut's shoreline and river systems. The goal is to have the bill's sponsor, Sen. Cohen, attend as a speaker or Christine Palm, as well as someone from Green Bank, More details to follow.

Committee member Molly Flueckiger continues to lead the efforts on action item 8; Inclusive Engagement, Communication and Education. Working within the Sustainable CT Equity Toolkit framework, the Deep River Committee is exploring ways to build and strengthen municipal processes to be more inclusive, cohesive, and representative of all community members, now and in the future. The Committee is wrapping up a baseline Communications Inventory as the first step in a process to identify Communications Best Practices for municipal communications. Molly has been working closely with Sustainable CT Fellows Megan Schweickert and Sofia DiNatale to develop a training tool to help Deep River optimize our digital communications for accessibility. The goal will be to hold a digital accessibility training event for municipal content publishers to share the information.

Molly has also been actively working with equity con-

sultant, Elizabeth McGee, as the committee tackles the requirements of action item 1; Inclusive and Equitable Community Impacts. Ultimately, the committee will ask McGee to hold an equity forum for stakeholders from municipal staff, elected officials, and committee and commission volunteers. Action item 1, sub action, 1.2; requires participation in equity training of at least 3 people from the municipality; to date, Molly, Carol Jones and Lenore Grunko have completed the 12 hours of equity training. Deep River is now eligible to earn credit in the Sustainable CT Certification process because a member of municipal staff, an elected official, and a volunteer have completed this training.

This past spring, the Deep River Garden Club lent a hand to the sustainable DR committee on action item 3; Well-Stewarded Land and Natural Resources, specifically sub action, 3.12; Enhance Pollinator Pathways. The group made up informational packets which taught about the importance of pollinators including a free pack of seeds and distributed them to every Deep River Elementary School student so that they could do their part and plant their own pollinator garden! Their efforts will earn Deep River credit towards this action. Awesome job! Interested in learning more? Go to the Sustainable CT web site (https://sustainablect.org).

Deep River Land Trust (DRLT) has conserved 38 more acres with the Williams Woodland Preserve!

At the very end of 2020, Lindy and Tim Williams generously donated 38.6 acres of forest overlooking the Connecticut River to DRLT. With this addition, DRLT now protects 255 acres of open space in our town. As you will see in the accompanying map, the Williams donation was extremely impactful. It directly connects to two existing DRLT preserves, which, in turn connects with three Essex Land Trust preserves. This network is accessible by road from DRLT's Guetliweg preserve on River Road. Combined, these properties form a 100-acre complex! Once we have completed the trails being designed for Williams, hikers will be able to start at any one of eight access points, move between towns, and even pair a hike with a paddle on the Connecticut River!



Deep River Elementary School

The 2020-2021 school year was historic! We celebrate the amazing successes of the year despite unprecedented challenges faced by students, families and staff.

August of 2020 was a time of great uncertainty for communities across the country. Educators and families struggled to imagine what a school day would look like based on all the new practices required in order to keep all community members safe and minimize exposure to the virus. It was hard to imagine 5-12 year old students managing social distancing and tolerating wearing masks for full days. Thanks to the unflagging partnership of the Connecticut River Area Health District (CRAHD) and collaboration of leaders across Chester, Deep River and Essex, we were able to welcome students back to the classroom.

As the year progressed, we were delighted to be able to invite all students back to school five days a week. This made building classroom community and in person student-to-student collaboration much more achievable. Some families opted to continue having their children access all learning from home. We are grateful to all our parent partners for their support during the days of learning from home. A special commendation to the families of our youngest learners - we could not have had such success without your efforts.

It would be impossible to overstate the heroic efforts of Deep River Elementary teachers and staff. They were thrust into a steep learning curve:

- Learning to manage the needs of students in person and students participating remotely
- Reimagining instruction in a setting where it is impossible to have students gather for in person partnerships or small group work
- Translating all instructional materials into a digital format
- Maintaining constant preparedness to shift to a fully remote format in case there is a need to quarantine

Despite all these challenges, the staff were able to create warm, connected classroom communities. While the adults longed for pre pandemic normalcy, the students still had fun, engaging days. Students made meaningful academic growth across the curriculum. Students adjusted to constant mask wearing and social distancing protocols masterfully – far better than we could have imagined last August.

DRES is a Choose Love School. This program includes direct instruction about Courage, Gratitude, Respect and Compassion in Action. These concepts are woven throughout the school day across curricular areas. Understanding the impact the stressors of the pandemic had on children and families, staff placed Social Emotional Learning at the center of their planning. While the 2020-2021 school year is now behind us, we are still living through a pandemic. We will continue to focus on the social and emotional needs of our students and their families in the coming year.

Unfortunately, there are many school traditions that do not translate to socially distanced settings. For example, we were sad not to invite our local veterans to DRES in November. All school assemblies were impossible this year. But, we were able to enjoy several whole school projects. This included:

- We had a school wide walk-a-thon to support the Jesse Lewis Choose Love Movement. DRES raised \$2,061.09 for this wonderful program.
- We were able to have a field day for students in Kindergarten - Third Grade and another for Fourth-Sixth Graders.
- We had small versions of our annual food drive and our Mitten Tree collecting hats and mittens.
- Sixth Graders continued to be featured in a daily newscast played in classrooms each day.
- We held our annual Veterans Day essay contest and the winners were able to present their work at a wreath laying ceremony for Memorial Day.
- We had small, volunteer run Science Fair and Invention Conventions.
- A student-led group raised awareness about the importance of protecting trees, raised \$365.05 for the Connecticut Tree Protection Association and gave each student a seedling to plant for Arbor Day.
- Students participated in many themed spirit days throughout the year.

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
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Deep River 60 Club






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Kirtland Commons

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Dry Pants Model Yacht Club

Spectators often wonder how we rescue our model CR-914 yachts when they get in trouble. The answer is: radio-controlled rescue boats.



The boats we sail at Plattwood Pond have no motors—just sails for power. Sometimes, Mother Nature takes away the wind. Sometimes, there are mechanical or electrical issues. The options to recovery are to wait for a boat to drift to shore, or go wading or swim to the rescue, or take matters into our own hands. We have experience with all of the options—including swimming!!

The Dry Pants Model Yacht Club has two rescue boats: a tug, and a boat that looks like a police rescue boat. One is always present at the pond when we sail. Each has an arm that hooks on the boat that needs help. Rescues take less than five minutes.

Deep River residents are always welcome to stopby and visit with sailors. If you have had some sailing experience, club members are very willing to give you a chance to take the radio-control helm of a boat or even provide you a loaner. And, if you really like the experience, we will be very happy to have you come and join us on a regular basis.

Planning & Zoning

The recently-concluded session of the Connecticut General Assembly resulted in a few pieces of legislation that will have some relevance to local Planning & Zoning or other land use issues. Perhaps the most high-profile of these was the legalization of adult-use recreational cannabis in Connecticut. While medical marijuana has been legal in Connecticut for many years, this additional permission has implications in all of our towns. The Town must decide whether to allow smoking or consuming marijuana in public spaces, such as parks. That will be a decision for the Board of Selectmen and possibly for Town Meeting to vote on an ordinance.


From a Zoning perspective, the Planning & Zoning Commission must decide whether to allow a cannabis retail operation to be established. The way the state law is written, if the Town does not take specific action, a potential cannabis retail shop may be allowed like any other shop, such as a grocery store, pharmacy, or boutique. The Town could opt to either prohibit them altogether or regulate them with a higher standard of review and require specific locations and separation distances from schools, churches, or public buildings. In either case, because of State licensing limits, it is extremely unlikely that the Town of Deep River would ever have any more than one (1) single retail operation in the community. The Planning & Zoning Commission will be working with the Economic Development Commission and Board of Selectmen over the next few months to discuss their approach on this matter.

In other legislative actions, PA 21-29 made changes to the State's Zoning Enabling Act (CGS §8-2) as relates to Accessory Apartments. Starting in 2023, all single-family dwellings in residential zones will be eligible to add a second, accessory dwelling unit via administrative approval. The property must conform to public health codes, appropriate setbacks, and other standard regulations, but Towns may no longer require lengthy public hearing or special permit processes to manage these dwellings. This law does have a potential "opt-out" provision should Deep River wish to consider a different approach to these accessory units, but that process requires super-majority votes of <u>both</u> Planning & Zoning and the Board of Selectmen to proceed.

Finally, the State has extended the flexibility of every local Board and Commission to hold either virtual, hybrid, or inperson public meetings through April, 2022. Each entity may decide for themselves if they wish to continue virtual meetings or return to an in-person model... with a few exceptions. Should any individual Board or Commission member wish to participate in a meeting virtually, even if all other members will be in-person, the Town will have to make that accommodation and provide a virtual component. Conversely, if a Commission wishes to continue entirely virtual meetings and a member of the public petitions at least 24 hours in advance to participate in the meeting in person, the Town must also make that accommodation. These two provisions seem to push towns toward a hybrid approach, where both in-person and virtual options are available. The Town of Deep River is working on acquiring and installing the technology to make these meetings more easily accessible.

Fountain Hill Cemetery





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
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
