All the rivers run into the sea...

Holy Cow, how about the weather? Pretty difficult not to notice the difference between summer 2022 and summer 2023! Last year the word was drought and we were asked to reduce our water usage as much as possible. While by scientific measures the drought might have ended in the fall, we had so little snow cover during the winter and such limited spring rains we really did not experience much of a spring freshet. about a quick change, as of this writing my rain gauge has recorded 10 inches of rain in July alone, and the Connecticut River reached flood levels in July for only the third time since 1897. Together with the rain this summer, not atypically, we have experienced considerable winds. The Town's aggressive clearing of dead or dying trees and limbs along our roads (in tandem with Eversource) have limited the duration of any loss of power or closed roads thus far, and we intend to maintain that work in preparation for the fall and winter storm seasons.

Just because I so enjoy Mark Twain, I will share parts of his address to the annual festival of the New England Society in December 1876:

"A toast:

The Oldest Inhabitant - The Weather - Who hath lost and doth forget it? Who hath it still and doth regret it?

"Gentlemen: I reverently believe that the Maker who made us all, makes everything in New England - but the weather. I don't know who makes that, but I think it must be raw apprentices in the Weather Clerk's factory, who experiment and learn how in New England... Old Probabilities has a mighty reputation for accurate

prophecy, and thoroughly well deserves it. You take up the papers and observe how crisply and confidently he checks off what today's weather is going to be on the Pacific, down South, in the Middle States, in the Wisconsin region; see him sail along in the joy and pride of his power till he gets to New England, and then - see his tail drop. He doesn't know what the weather is going to be like in New England. He can't any more tell than he can tell how many Presidents of the United States there's going to be next year. Well, he mulls over it, and by and by he gets out something about like this: Probable nor'-east to sou'-west winds, varying to the southard and westard and eastard and points between; high and low barometer, swapping around from place to place; probable areas of rain, snow, hail, and drought, succeeded or preceded by earthquakes, with thunder and lightning. Then he jots down this postscript from his wandering mind, to cover accidents: "But it is possible that the program may be wholly changed in the meantime."

Deep River Day...

Last September we enjoyed the 27th annual Deep River Day hosted by the Deep River Merchants Association in cooperation with the Town of Deep River. We had a blast celebrating our town and the 75th anniversary of the official change of our name from Saybrook to Deep River. This year, the Town, through our Parks and Recreation Commission, will be making efforts to continue the traditional celebration of all things Deep River bookended with the 5K Road Race in the morning at Devitt and a fireworks show in the evening at Plattwood, with planning underway for filling in the day. (We are hopeful to fit an Old-Time Baseball game into the mix). Please look for announcements of what might be taking place, and feel free to contact Parks and Recreation or the Town Hall if you would like to participate in the planning or sponsorship of some of the events.

A 100-year-old eagle...

This May we extended our traditional Memorial Day Ceremony to celebrate and acknowledge something really cool – something that was put in place 100 years ago, on Memorial Day 1923 –following what was then referred to as the world war, a war that resulted in

the loss approximately 116,516 Americans. Keep in mind that the H1N1 Influenza Pandemic known as the Spanish flu killed an estimated 675,000 Americans between the years 1918 & 1921.

On December 30, 1921 the Deep River Business-man's Association gathered, and during the course of the meeting discussed how to best recognize the sacrifice the people of Deep River had made to ensure the survival and success of liberty in our country and around the world. The results of these efforts were that a bronze eagle would be cast in Bridgeport and placed at the top of a stone monument to be set at the north end of the Town Green. Fox and Becker out of Middletown cast a bronze plaque and incorporated a space for a time capsule, which took the form of a copper box, to be set inside the monument. (Fox and Becker remains in business to this day).

100 years later, with little knowledge of what had been set in the time capsule, the Board of Selectmen, working closely with the local veterans and the Deep River Historical Society laid out a plan to open the time capsule and acknowledge the efforts made a century ago.

From the very beginning it was determined that we would require expert advice, so we contacted Peabody Museum, Wadsworth Atheneum, other historical agencies, including the State of Connecticut Public Records Administrators Office and the State of Connecticut archeologist, both current and emeritus, for advice on how to move forward.



All advice led to opening the plaque and its contents immediately to ensure its condition and safety. The committee determined to follow this advice, one step at a time, making

every effort to be able to share contents as soon as possible.

With this in mind, we arranged to remove the time capsule, with no real idea what was behind the plaque. After taking two hours and thirty minutes to carefully remove the plaque, we discovered a 6" x 7" x 3" cop-

per box. Thirty minutes later the box was removed from the stone and placed in the vault at the town clerk's office.



More correspondence with experts led to bring-

ing the box to Quinnipiac University to be examined with both X-Ray and MRI technology. The folks at Quinnipiac were excited to help, and not only enjoyed the very different experience, but seemed fascinated with the story. Disappointingly, we were not able to determine with any confidence what was inside.



Experts all advised that we could open the box to see for ourselves, so we did. After another three-hour effort it was determined that there was enough water infiltration damage to the

material that we could not remove the contents with any confidence that nothing would be damaged. After considerable research it was determined to send the box to the Northeast Document Conservation Center in Andover, Massachusetts, the number one historical document preservation center in New England.

While we do not yet have the contents of the box in hand, we do know what was included in the copper box:

- A booklet the financial affairs of the town of Saybrook for 1920-1921
- A newspaper, the Deep River New Era, dated Memorial Day, May 25,1923
- A list of the names of men from Saybrook who served in "the world war, and the civil war."
- The minutes from the Deep River Businessman's Association regarding the erection of this memorial
- 9 postcards of Deep River as it was in 1923
- Approximately 300 pledge cards recognizing contributors to the funding of the "soldiers memorial."

When the materials are received, they will be put on display at the Deep River Town Hall for a number of weeks, then set on permanent display at the Museum at the Deep River Historical Society

We will reproduce all of what was recovered and place those copies back in the stone, on Veterans Day 2023 when we will permanently set the memorial plaque in place.

It is our goal that on the same day in November 2023, we will set in place a new time capsule to be opened in 2123 which will be filled with memorabilia that is determined from a pool of students and citizens. Please feel free to contribute ideas for what will be included.

Highways and infrastructure...and important Main Street News

The Connecticut Department of Transportation is replacing the stop light support structure, traffic lights, and cross light stands and mechanisms that control traffic at the intersection of Main Street, Elm Street, and River Street. In the end this project will increase traffic safety and will be a good project for the Town, but the period of construction will be, at the least, a

pain in the neck. While the project has been in the planning stages for more than two years, we were notified on July 26 that work is set to begin this fall. Work is expected to begin on or around October 1, 2023 with a projected date of completion in November of 2024. This work will be done in six or seven "mobilizations" of approximately 3 – 7 days, with lengthy intervals of no work being done. We will work closely with DOT so that we can let you know when the mobilizations will occur and what impact they might have on traffic. Please see below for instructions on signing up for email news blasts.

By the time this issue goes to press we will have completed paving projects on West Elm Street and Rattling Valley Roads and Kelsey Hill Road will have been chip sealed in our efforts to extend the life of our roads. We are scheduled to complete the paving of sections of River Road, Bushy Hill, and Westbrook Road this summer. We will notify you as the schedule becomes clear.

The Deep River Fire Department has taken delivery of a new engine for our fire department. At the time of this writing the engine is expected to come into service within the week. Simultaneously, the Department has ordered a new Tanker Truck that is currently in Connecticut being built to Federal, State, and Deep River's own specifications.

We took delivery of a new Ford Explorer police vehicle to replace a twelve-year-old Dodge Charger that was costing us more to keep on the road than it was worth.

Lions and Tigers and Bears.... go buy

Deep River's vibrant downtown continues to be blessed with venerable shops that serve well the needs of our community, including a wide variety of goods and services. We have managed to maintain and support, whether through auspicious forethought or fortunate happenstance, a virtual replica of the kind of small-town Main Street that was ubiquitous until banished by the automobile.

The Deep River Post Office has been in its present location since the 1950s, having outgrown the space it had occupied since 1893 in the then newly dedicated Town

Hall. It is difficult to remember a time when our shopping center, established in 1957, was not the anchor of our shopping district. Other familiar reminders of an earlier era: Fremuts and Fred & Georges garages.

Deep River Hardware, Celebrations, Eye Doctors, Anchor and Compass/Compass Rose, Adams, Cumberland Farms, Walgreens, Liberty Bank, Red House, Whistle Stop, Hally Jo's, Calamari's Tavern, The Pet's Choice, G's Treasures, The Riverwind Inn, Dunkin' Donuts, Edward Jones and Atwood's Auto Appearance have been operating on Main Street for time spanning five to fifty or more years.

Let's visit the North End of Main Street:

A restaurant of more than a half-century standing: Landing & Main. The roster of earlier titles includes Redwood Lounge, Louie's, Duke's Whalers Pub, Rankin's Pub, the Ivory Pub, and finally...Landing & Main. Over the past three years, during the Pandemic's reign, long-time owner Sal Camera has done a great job of bringing his restaurant back to being "a place to go." Meanwhile, on the opposite corner of Kirtland, we have a new lunch spot, Chambo's Italian Deli, and across Main Street, Promethea Arts, a wonderful companion to SOMA as "Arts" bookends to Downtown. Let's not forget Eight Mile Meadow Bakery, Face Arts Music, and Digital Sign and Graphics.

While reviving the north end, make note of the former Whelen, more recently PCI, complex on Winter Avenue. I make note here of a company that, although not in the retail sector, has proven to be a Cinderella story of a successful small (but definitely growing) small business with international reach. Colanar, which designs and manufactures high-tech machinery for the medical industry, has recently expanded production at their Winter Avenue facility. Since 2007 Bernd and Lucy Stroeter have grown their business from a backyard outbuilding on Kirtland Street to the Plattwood Industrial Park to their current space on Winter Ave. Colanar is a shining example of the benefits public / private cooperation can yield. In the same complex Patrick and Tina Gilbert continue to grow the River Valley Esthetic Institute and remember to visit John and Kerstin at High Nine Brewery.

The number of newer businesses lends us confidence that our Commercial District continues to thrive: The Rusty Rail, Sean Scott's new company headquarters, replacing the former Rent All, Head to Tail Dog Grooming is in the process of moving in next door. Honeycone Ice Cream is expanding and will be creating deliciousness at 39 Main Street (the old White Way Laundry or Marble Factory building, whichever you care to remember).

Salon 357, State Farm, and Razz will welcome Brick and Mortar, a new shop in the building formerly occupied by Chaos and more recently by Allen James who has relocated his studio a bit south on Main Street. A little further down the road an established investor in Deep River recently purchased a building and has expressed only positive thoughts about the north end of Main Street, and we have discussed the possibility of another public/private cooperative effort working toward economic revitalization and affordable housing.

The Nest has expanded into the tattoo parlor space and we are working with the new owner of 160 Main Street who has met with the Economic Development Commission in order to present his wide-ranging plans for that property, which, while still in preliminary stages, are exciting to think about. Stay tuned!

It is the nature of the beast that some shops will leave, through retirement or other business decisions. We will miss The Spot, which while only in town a short while, had an impact on our Main Street and whose proprietors were active members of our Merchants Association (as were their predecessors in that space). History tells us that the storefront will find a new business before long. Deep River Ice reports a tremendous first season and is now a staple (no wonder, their Italian Ice is the best this side of Brooklyn).

We have worked for three years with the former and the current owner of the Citizens Bank Building, and while neither Hartford Hospital nor Guilford Savings Bank nor similar corporate possibilities (in addition to multiple restaurant developers), could determine how to make the building suit their specific needs, the property is currently under contract to be purchased by Connecticut Coastal Academy, bringing 23 full time

employees to town.

Mount Saint John's has been closed since 2019, and while the pandemic might have discouraged major investors, the property is currently under contract and is anticipated to be on our tax rolls soon.

The Smith & Wesson closing of their Deep River plant has been in the news of late, but it is important to keep in mind that they are not scheduled to leave until December of 2024. Never-the-less, we are continuing to work with the current property owner in aid of securing a tenant who would be ready and waiting when the building is vacated.

While change occurs regularly and there is always work that can be done, there is plenty of positive to celebrate about our downtown and the best way to do that is to go there. By the time you read this all of our back to school/change of season shopping will be completed, but please, as the holidays approach remember those three little words, **local**, **local**, **local** when you need to shop.

Speaking of local, don't forget to visit the Deep River Farmer's Market at the Congregational Church Field. A rousing success in their inaugural season, Harvest Month promises to bring as much fresh produce, meat, and foodstuff as you will need. Great job Taco, et al!!
















Anyone who will not be available on election day may vote by absentee ballot and applying has never been easier than with the new online application portal: https://oabrsots.ct.gov/ They may also apply in person at the Town Clerk's office any time before the election. (Sorry, parents, but your child must be the one to sign this application). This application can be mailed in or dropped in the Official Ballot Drop Box, once it's been unlocked, in front of the Town Hall. Once the application is on file, the Town Clerk will mail the ballot as soon as it becomes available on October 6, 2023. The office is open Monday-Wednesday 9:00am-4:00pm, Thursday 9:00am-6:30pm and Friday 9-noon.

Waste Reduction Pilot Program - DEEP

Deep River has collected over 58,500 pounds of Food Scraps in the Waste Reduction Pilot Program!! Keep up the great work! You can still join now if you've missed it!

Deep River is one of 15 towns running Waste Reduction Pilot programs, from a CT DEEP grant, and in just 6 months we've already separated over 58,500 pounds of food from our trash. The food scraps we've collected are being processed into energy through anaerobic digestion. This program is going great, and we want to see more participation; this tonnage is only about 43% of what the grant consultant, Waste Zero, believes is available in Deep River's waste stream.

We have been so amazed at the feedback, support, and participation in town that we've formed a new Ad Hoc Waste Reduction Committee to study and advise the town on how to proceed once the pilot has wrapped up. We are seeking additional members, so please reach out to the selectman's office at 860-526-6020, option 1 or selectman@deepriverct.us if you are interested in participating.

The state and the region are currently in a Waste Crisis as there is no additional space to dispose of garbage. One way to help is to work to reduce the amount of trash created.

The Ad Hoc Waste Reduction Committee is exploring how "Unit-Based Pricing," a proven waste reduction concept, could work to reduce the amount of waste created and to save the town money on trash costs, which could help collect more food scraps to be used for clean energy. "Pay as You Throw" is a way to manage and reduce trash by paying for the amount you dispose of instead of a flat fee. This program has proven to create behavior change and is a fairer way to pay for trash since one can control how much you pay by controlling how much trash you make. The orange bags for trash are similar to how a "Pay as You Throw" effort would work - it's an easy challenge to try to fit all of your trash into only 2 orange bags per week. The orange bags act as a measuring cup for waste and help everyone to think about what they are throwing away - for instance textiles can be donated, yard waste can be dropped off

or mulched on your lawn, and items that still have use like an old coffee pot can be given to a friend or to those in need.

Take the challenge - There's still time to participate! Do you need your free green and orange bags? You can get them from the Deep River Transfer Station.

Thanks for giving this a try and getting so many tons of food out of the trash and into clean energy! We will be having a town meeting on this program in the coming months, and we want your feedback!

Food Scraps

Good news for food scrapping! PAPER TOWELS ARE ACCEPTED!

It's kind of funny how something so specific can create confusion but the final word is that soiled paper towels are accepted in the food scrap container now. (Please do NOT include any paper towels soiled with chemicals.)



Meanwhile, many thanks to those people who are separating and disposing of their food scraps in an environmentally friendly way. Disposal can be in your backyard compost, handed off to the chickens next door or at the Deep River Transfer Station. Whatever environmentally friendly way you do it, we applaud you.

If you haven't joined the trend, please do. Removing food waste from the trash and converting those scraps into clean, renewable energy can save us money. We can help you solve the problems you might be having to organize the process of separating your food waste from household garbage. There are many ways to go about it and we're happy to help. Region #4 Food Scraps Fundraiser a Success!

All 5 Region #4 schools will be separating food scraps to reduce garbage sent to the landfill. The 3 Tri-Towns have raised enough money to pay for 2 years of transportation costs involved with food scrapping by local fundraising and a hefty Sustainable CT matching fund grant. It will begin this fall so that new habits can be made both at home and in school.

Thin Plastic and Film Recycling

"Recycle More Than the Bag!"

Changing habits to reduce waste continues with thin plastic recycling. In February, Deep River joined the NexTrex Community Challenge with the goal of educating our community about thin plastics. If we reach the goal of diverting 500 pounds of thin plastics and film from the waste stream, we earn a free park bench. As of publication we have collected 530 pounds! Soon we will have a new park bench for all to enjoy. Congratulations!

Keep the recycling going!

While getting a bench is very exciting, even more exciting is that we as a community are keeping all that plastic out of the landfill and giving it a new life. Thin plastics are impossible to avoid and cannot be recycled in the blue bins - they clog up the automated recycling sorting machines. If you haven't already, start collecting thin plastics in your home and see how it adds up.

If you own a business, you can participate as well. We already have two enthusiastic business owners in town doing their part: Compass Rose/Anchor & Compass and Celebrations. Thank you for doing your part!

What are thin plastics? They are more than the bag. So many products come wrapped, protected, and delivered in thin plastics. Plastic films labeled with #2 or #4 recycling symbol (polyethylene films), Bread Bags, Ziploc and other resealable food storage bags, dry cleaning bags, newspaper sleeves, product wrap (around items like paper towels, toilet paper and water bottles), air pillows & bubble wrap, retail bags, plastic shipping envelopes, ice bags, bubble wrap, produce bags and more!

Please don't include saran from meat packaging, or any soiled and wet bags or wrap.

Please do be sure your plastics are CLEAN and DRY.

Confused about what is and what isn't allowed in the thin plastic bins?

Thin Plastics Frequently Asked Questions:

Can I recycle plastic bags and film if they...

... are colored plastic?

YES, the color does not affect the recycling process.

...tear like paper?

NO, please do not include, as they are not currently accepted in film/bag recycling bins.

...stretch when I pull it apart with both hands?

YES, this is the correct type of plastic to recycle. If it doesn't stretch or it tears like paper, please throw it in the trash. NOTE: Cereal box liners ARE allowed.

... have a shiny metal look like a chip bag or candy wrappers?

NO, this plastic film is not recyclable.

... are pet food bags?

NO, this plastic is not recyclable.

...have a paper label or tape stuck on?

YES, but labels, tape and adhesive strips should be removed if possible. You can simply cut off the label as the integrity of the bag isn't important to the recycler.

... are thicker, stiff plastics for linens and beddings (including anything with a real zipper)?

NO, they are not the kind of plastic recyclers can use in their processes.

...contains other materials or is dirty or wet?

NO, plastic film must be clean and dry and the right type in order for it to be recycled. Please remove all other materials like tape, paper receipts, food residue and crumbs, and crinkly or rigid plastics (bottles and tubs). These contaminants can ruin the quality of the plastic and may result in it not being recycled.

... are boat wrap?

NO, because its intended use is to protect boats outside, which means it could contain barriers or be contaminated with moisture and debris that are problematic in the recycling process.

... are very shiny (like floral wrap) and make a loud crinkly sound when crumpled?

NO, this plastic film is not recyclable.

...have this NexTrex® label?

YES, brands and retailers are using this label to let consumers know that the plastic film package is recyclable.

...are labeled degradable AND recyclable?

NO, recyclers can't risk using degradable plastics in new items so these items are not recyclable.

Deep River Fire Department



The membership of the department is very proud of 5 members of the Junior Division. AJ Kerop, Erin Lee, Noah Lee, Churchill Roberts, and Tyler Stein spent a week in the heat of the summer, in full gear, working hard to learn and master

aspects of emergency training. Camp culminated with an exhibit of their skills at graduation. Congratulations AJ, Erin, Noah, Churchill, and Tyler; we are proud of your hard work, determination, and dedication.

A portion of the standards for attending; thirty-two students are accepted into each session. This session immerses the students into the mission, culture, and skill set of the fire service. A strong emphasis is placed on character, self and mutual respect,



individual empowerment and teamwork as students participate in physical fitness training, learn in a class-room setting, compete in team-based activities and progress in squads through a series of practical training evolutions divided into engine, ladder, and rescue company fire ground operations. At the end of the session, the students respond to and mitigate a simulated multi-story building fire utilizing the skills that they have learned over the week.

In June of 2021 the town approved the purchase of a new engine. The contract was signed to have Gowans and Knight Company in Watertown, Connecticut build the new engine. This beautiful piece of apparatus was delivered to us in March of 2023.

The new engine has: 2022 Spartan Gladiator chassis, seating for 6 firefighters, 1000 gallon water tank, 30 gallons class A foam and a 2000 gpm pump.



The department has been vigorously training with this new fire apparatus, Engine 551. This new engine re-

places a 40 year old engine. Consequently, the learning curve on the new truck is technologically advanced compared to the former. The new features offer more efficiency in time and management at a fire scene.

We are all very appreciative of the hard work involved to develop a criteria for the purchase of a new vehicle. Thank you to the town for the support we received to allow this project to move forward. Thank you to the truck committee who spent countless hours researching, visiting manufacturers, and holding meetings to formulate a plan for the best possible outcome.

It is very rewarding to know that the entire town will benefit from this new piece of apparatus as it is the first out to all calls.

For the first time in many years the DRFD chicken bbq was once again held. Thank you to all who came out in support of this fundraiser. Thank you to John Ely for heading the charge and organizing



it, to Steve David for coming out of retirement to show us the ropes, to Agata Luff and Hannah Partyka for working all day with us, to all the members who helped set up, break down, cook and serve the meal and to our talented musicians John Martorelli, Del Perez, and Ken Hebert; you certainly set the tone. At the end of the day, left over meals were delivered to Deep River Senior Housing.





- At Plattwood- no fishing from the beach, no floatation devices, no outside grills.
- Please do not bring in glass bottles.



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
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Deep River Garden Club

Community The Community Health Committee (CHC) will be at Marvin Field (the DRCC church green) amongst all the fun on

Deep River Day collecting toilet paper and other paper products as we challenge all to help us build a toilet paper tower! How high can we build it?! Please come down with your donations of paper products as they are in high demand and not something typically donated to the pantry. Did you know that paper products and personal hygiene products are not able to be purchased under SNAP (supplemental nutrition assistance program)? All donations will be put in the food pantry at 56 High Street for our Deep River friends in need. For every donation, take a spin on the candy wheel for a free treat!

The committee is tasked with overseeing and raising funds for the Community Health Fund (CHF), providing support for the town's social service programs, its social service director and the town's food pantry among other things. Therefore, the committee is so thankful to the members of the public who came out and voted to allocate ARPA (American Rescue Plan Act) funds to the CHF. These monies will go far to help Deep River residents identified by Social Services Director, Rosie Bininger, who need help with heating fuel costs, food, and other expenses as we head into the fall and winter months.

Our fall 2023 annual appeal will be mailed out shortly. Please consider making a monetary donation to our cause. The money collected is used to purchase food for the food pantry, food for the weekly backpack program that CHC runs for DRES students, and to purchase gift cards to Adams and Cumberland Farms that the social service director can give out. The money collected in this annual fundraiser has also gone towards fuel assistance.

We want to thank local groups and businesses who plan fundraisers and take up food collections for the pantry such as the Rotary Club, Face Arts Music, Bennett's Books, DRFD, and our local churches. Please plan to attend and enjoy some great music from local musicians. The price of admission is a donation, either cash or a non-perishable food item for the food pantry.

This past spring, the CHC asked Bininger to tally the number of residents visiting the pantry on a monthly basis. In May, we recorded 129 visits to the panty. June saw a rise in visits to 146 and July closed out with a lower number of visits, 65. For such a small pantry, it is quite busy. Our neighbors are in need. Please remember that need



when shopping; maybe buy an extra item or two if it's on sale and drop it off in the lobby at 56 High Street. Dona-

tions can be made anytime the building is open, Monday-Friday. We anticipate the number of visits will rise again as we head into the colder months.

The committee continues to administer the Backpack program for students at Deep River Elementary School. This program was set up to ensure that students who might otherwise face food insecurity on days without school, do not go without. During the school year, the program is administered week-

ly and during summer school recess, the boxes are assembled with four weeks' worth of food and distributed once a month. We are proud that we can provide food assistance during the summer months as neighboring towns are not able to keep their backpack programs going yearround. Well done Deep River. Kudos to DRES's social worker, Laura Kasprow, who personally delivers the food to the students year-round! And kudos to the members of the committee who take turns shopping for food items, assembling bags and/or boxes and having them ready for Kasprow on Friday mornings. The committee could not sustain this program without outside help; so, thank you to the Deep River Rotary Club and to a dedicated group of town hall employees who have each taken on this task for 1 or 2 months of the year. Many hands make light work, and this is a perfect example of caring Deep River residents at work!

The menu for the weekly bags and monthly boxes calls for fresh produce. The committee would like to thank Scott's Orchards of Deep River who donated fresh fruit to the summer boxes. Also, thank you to Whelen Engineering, who donated over 100 string bags that were utilized for the weekly food items.

Your generosity is greatly appreciated.

The CHC was created in 2010 and continues to serve a vital part of our community. Committee members are voted into their positions at town meetings. Planning & Zoning


During their 2021 Session, the Connecticut General Assembly passed a series of changes to the State's Zoning Enabling Act (CGS §8-2) that affected how municipalities across the state were asked to deal with land use matters. Some of these changes were welcomed by pro-housing development advocates, and by amaritude by skeptics of state involvement in local zoning. One of the most significant changes dealt with how towns regulated Accessory Dwelling Units (ADU), also known as "in-law apartments" or simply "accessory apartments."

The new law (Public Act 21-29) requires all municipalities, unless they chose to affirmatively opt-out, to regulate the allowance of ADUs in the same way they regulated single-family residences, within certain parameters. In other words, if you are allowed to build or occupy a one-family dwelling on a residentially-zoned property, you should also be allowed to add an accessory dwelling unit on that same land. The ADU can be either within the existing structure, added on to the existing house, or be within a separate building on the same lot (like a small cottage or an apartment above a garage or in a barn).

In response to this law, as well as to promote expanding housing opportunities in town as part of their first Affordable Housing Plan (https://www.deepriverct. us/planning-zoning/files/affordable-housing-plan),the Deep River Planning & Zoning Commission changed their Zoning Regulations in 2022. The new Regulation allows any residential property to have an ADU through a simple administrative process. As long as the new dwelling unit meets basic size and setback standards, and can be supported by the property's wastewater system (sewer or septic), an ADU can be added.

Recognizing that very often, the general public is not aware of how Zoning Regulations work or how they change property-owners' rights, the Commission is seeking to provide some public information on this new ability. They have prepared a short overview of the topic and will be seeking to spread the word about ADUs throughout Deep River.

Fountain Hill Cemetery

Early in 1851, 26 leading citizens of the village of Deep River, (town of Saybrook) met at the store owned by G. Spencer (known today as the Family Laundry on Main Street) to discuss where to bury the dead. As a result, an association was formed and purchased a territory encompassing 40 acres situated a little east of the village of Deep River and sacredly consecrated for the purposes of a cemetery. For 172 years The Fountain Hill Cemetery Association has maintained the cemetery and continues to oversee the care and burial of our residents. Its beautiful park-like setting draws many of our residents on a daily basis to walk, read and relax under the shade trees.

Prior to 1851 these 40 acres were used as a quarry, shipping out local stone to places along the Atlantic Coastline as far away as New Orleans. This land was barren of trees. The Rural Cemetery movement had reached its peak and burial practices were rapidly changing. In 1868, The Association hired a prominent landscape architect, B. F. Hathaway of Stamford, CT to create the park-like setting that we all enjoy today. A news clipping from the New Era mentions that Arborvitae trees from Maine had arrived by barge at the Deep River Landing for planting at the cemetery.

In 1885, Beers described the cemetery: "The special attractiveness of Fountain Hill Cemetery consists not in its monuments, but in itself, in its own natural beauty as heightened by art. Its park like spaces, shaded with a variety of deciduous and evergreen trees; its umbrageous ravines; and scenery that everywhere gratifies the eye, unite in making a scene of summer or autumnal beauty that is rarely found in association with the dead, and cannot fail to have an elevating and refining influence upon the living." We are grateful to our diligent crew who work hard to maintain this level of beauty today.

Many of our trees were planted in 1868. The hurricane of 1938 destroyed more than 100 trees at the cemetery and only a few were replaced. Many of you are aware that we have consistently been taking down aging trees to protect the monuments and many more are in danger of coming down. Dr. Stephen Gephard, a member of our Board of Directors has created a plan to replace

the trees. The Fountain Hill Cemetery Preservation Society is starting a fund to make these plans a reality. Anyone wishing to donate to this project can contact Rich Forristall 860-790-0061.

The cemetery pond was added to enhance the beauty of the cemetery in 1929. The Association hired F. Arrigoni and Sons of Middletown to do the work for \$4,500. Designed to be no more than three feet deep originally, it is currently less than twelve inches deep. The Preservation Society of Fountain Hill Cemetery is working to enhance this area once again and making it deep enough to accommodate a fountain.

We are also working on a website to showcase the beauty of Fountain Hill Cemetery and keep residents up to date on ongoing projects and how you can help or get involved with the Preservation Society.


Deep River Meetings on Television and Online

Here at A Little Compassion and The Nest Coffee House, we embrace every season as a fresh beginning, a chance to hit the reset button and change things up a bit. Fall always brings new school interns into our midst and that means new skills, talents, and energy of young adults with differing abilities. We look forward to introducing them to you and to the world of work while setting the stage for their bright futures. We'd love to hear from you if there is a young adult in your life who may benefit from our programs!

For those new to neurodiversity language, neurodiversity is a newer umbrella term that includes many disabilities that impact how people process the world. Disabilities including autism, down syndrome, ADHD, depression, anxiety, Tourette's syndrome, and others all fall under this umbrella. Being neurodiverse (or neurodivergent) means that a person experiences the world differently and may include their having sensory challenges, alternative ways of learning and seeing things as well as needs for simple (or complex accommodations). Accommodations such as an option to wear headphones to dampen loud noises or the ability to use a visual task list are necessary for their success, but also often benefit all people.

The other benefit of neurodiversity is that it teaches all of us the power of understanding, compassion, and inclusion. Being curious and assuming good intentions is our go-to approach when a staff seem to be doing something "wrong." You'd be surprised at what you can learn by simply asking a staff member why they did something. A favorite example at The Nest is when an employee served up an iced latte without stirring it. By stepping aside and saying simply "Hey why wasn't that latte stirred;" we learned that they not only thought it was pretty with its visible layers of ice, espresso, and cream, but they also felt that an adult should be able to stir their own drink. Honestly, it was pretty and, of course, the adult could stir their own drink. But with just a little redirection and clarification of "The Nest Way" of serving iced lattes ready to drink, we were back on track in a flash and even had a few laughs about adult responsibilities.

We are thankful for every customer that comes into the shop because each purchase not only has the power to help us fulfill our mission financially but more importantly, each visitor provides our staff important experiences interacting with customers. Building confidence and skills for their next work endeavor can be lifechanging. So come see us soon. There is something new happening every day including our Nest Gatherings, Compassion Story Hours, and much, much more!

Yale Book Award

For the third time in as many years, three students from Valley Regional High School have been honored with the Yale Book Award. This year's recipients are Mia Bibbiani of Chester, Mikaela Carlin of Deep River, and Lucas Silva of Essex. Including this year's recipients, nine students from Valley Regional High School have been recognized with the Yale Book Award since 2021.

The Yale Book Award is conferred upon students in their junior year of high school for showing outstanding personal character and intellectual promise. Students throughout the US and internationally may be considered for the award, which is presented in partnership between Yale's alumni communities and schools within those communities. While multiple students from the same school may receive the award in the same year, it is rare for a school to achieve this kind of recognition for its students.

This year's three award recipients from VRHS – one from each of Chester, Deep River, and Essex – were recognized at the school's annual awards assembly in May. The book awards chosen for these students reflect each recipient's interests and possible future aspirations. Mia Bibbiani received a copy of "Long Day's Journey into Night" by Connecticut's Eugene O'Neill. Mikaela Carlin was presented with "Accidental Conflict" by Senior Yale Fellow Stephen Roach. And Lucas Silva was recognized with "Interaction of Color" by Josef Albers, the former Chair of the Department of Design at the Yale School of Art. Each book includes a bookplate inscribed with the student's name and recognizing the student's achievement as a Yale Book Award recipient.

Bradford Galiette of Essex, Secretary for the Yale College Class of 2008 and a former member of the Yale Alumni Association Board of Governors, remarked, "It's thrilling to see this year's awarded students exhibit the kind of intellectual curiosity, creativity, leadership, and strength of character that are so very much needed both here in our towns and in communities around the world. I'm grateful we find students as talented as Mia, Mikaela, and Lucas among us in our corner of

Connecticut, and may we continue to wholeheartedly celebrate and encourage them and their classmates as they get ready to take their next steps."




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Deep River 60 Club
