

### **COVID-19 Vaccines**

All those 65 and older are eligible to receive the COVID-19 vaccine in CT. The registration process may be difficult for some people aged 65 and over, especially for those who don't have email or the internet. If you have a neighbor or friend that you know of who may be in that position please assist them with this process.

The CT DPH has trained specialists to answer the new Vaccine Appointment Assist Line which is available 7 days a week between 8am and 8pm to assist people with scheduling their vaccine appointment. They can be accessed by calling 877-918-2224.

Please share this information with loved ones and neighbors aged 65 and older who have not yet received their COVID-19 vaccine.

#### **HOW DO I GET VACCINATED?**

There are several ways to schedule an appointment to get vaccinated and all require an appointment. You can go through Nutmeg Pharmacy, through a Health Care Provider, through CVS, or through Vaccine Administration Management System (VAMS).

### News from the Selectman's Office

"Groundhog found fog.

New snows and blue toes.

Fine and dandy for Valentine candy.

Snow spittin'; if you're not mitten-smitten, you'll be frostbitten!

By jing-y feels spring-y." The Old Farmer's Almanac

The winter solstice is my favorite day of the year, for the simple reason that once past the solstice I know that more sunshine is headed our way. Sure, once the holidays are behind us we are faced with a long, cold January, followed by a snowy February, and who knows whether March will be a lion, a lamb, or most likely, a combination of the two. But we see more sunlight every day, and that sunshine gets a little warmer every day, and the snow, once removed from the driveway, is pretty and fun to play in. We cheer when the Groundhog doesn't see his shadow, Valentine's Day is a good excuse to indulge in a little chocolate, and St. Patrick's Day is right around the corner. All of that adds up to one thing: Spring!!!!. So much to enjoy and so much to look forward to.

The gatherings and travel that accompany the holidays brought with them a marked increase in COVID-19 cases across our state, which was reflected here in Deep River. With more than month between the holidays and the time of this writing we are seeing our active cases heading back to single digits. That is where we want to be.

### Responsibilities to ourselves and to others

Over the past year our Town Hall has continued to operate, uninterrupted. Dependent upon the rate of positive cases in town, the Town Hall offices have been open and available to the public, either with limited access, by appointment, or via telephone and electronically. We are currently open by appointment and will continue to monitor the situation and attempt to balance public safety and the safety of our staff with accessibility. Thank you for your continued patience and cooperation.

Despite our extended efforts, we have not reached the end of this journey. Please, do not relax your efforts. The difficulty of staying home, of isolating ourselves will only increase. We need to get out. We need to say hello to each other (at an appropriate distance, or course). If you don't feel a need to distance, to wear a mask, to distance because you feel safe, please keep your neighbors in mind. They may not feel as safe as you. I will paraphrase Dr. Fauci when he speaks of our responsibilities to ourselves and to others:

"Some of the people contracting this virus will have no symptoms, some will have mild symptoms, some will suffer symptoms enough to put them at home for a few days, some will be in bed for weeks and have symptoms even after they recover, and others will go to the hospital. Some people will require the use of oxygen, some will require intensive care, some will get intubated, and some will die. This can lead to a very confusing situation where some people might trivialize the virus, thinking "it doesn't bother me, so who cares?"

We have a dual responsibility. We have a responsibility to ourselves, because thinking that young people have no deleterious consequences is not true. We're seeing more and more complications in young people. But even though the majority — the overwhelming majority of them — do well, what you can't forget is that, if you get infected and spread the infection, even though you yourself might not get sick, you are part of the process of the dynamics of an outbreak. And what you might be propagating, inadvertently — perhaps innocently — is infecting someone who then infects someone else who is someone who is vulnerable. That could be your grandmother, your grandfather, your sick uncle, who winds up in the hospital, or dying."

### The return of STEAP

For the first time since 2016 the State of Connecticut has issued the Small Town Economic Assistance Program (STEAP) and Deep River was fortunate enough to be one of the Towns awarded funding. We have received a grant for \$119,000 in order to undertake the "Deep River Open Government Enhancements" project. This will allow for us to install audio-visual cameras and broadcast capabilities in the auditorium, a GIS system, online land use permitting, new computers, and three electronic message boards. In reviving the STEAP program the governor implemented a special Corona Virus provision to assist towns with expenditures related to their ongoing response to the pandemic and this program will allow for us to better offer remote participation and communication with you, our town.

### A Bridge too Far

If you drive West Elm Street, I am sure you have noticed the beginning of the anticipated State DOT bridge replacement project at the bridge over the Deep River near the Deep River Farms. You will see activity beginning with the temporary location of utilities and other preparatory work. Current plans are for 69 days of bridge closure and a full detour, beginning on June 16 and lasting until August 25. We are working with the DOT and the contractor to

try and shorten that timeline in order to open West Elm as quickly as possible.

This morning we are reviewing the "day after" effects of a potent nor-easter that dropped over 12" of snow on our town. The snow fell for nearly 16 hours sometimes at a rate of two to three inches an hour, faster than our plow trucks could push it aside. Fortunately, at the end of the storm the temperature rose to above freezing, helping with the cleanup. Kudos to our highway crew for working so hard to keep our roads safe in the face of adversity!

### It's Budget Time Again

At this time of year, though our thoughts may turn to planning our gardens and starting our seeds, we acknowledge that preparation of next year's budget takes priority. We initiate our process coincident with Governor Lamont's announcement of his proposed state budget. COVID-19 has put considerable stress on our State Budget leaving the Governor with many difficult decisions, Education or Public Safety? Mass Transportation or Highway Maintenance? State Aid to Municipalities seems to always be in jeopardy.

Be assured that the Board of Selectmen and the Board of Finance will be working diligently to fund our town responsibly, but that as individual citizens it is important for each of us to consider attending Region 4 budget workshops and meetings.

As budgets grow increasingly lean, competition for funding grows proportionally. Lines are easily drawn, and often challenged. Harsh words broadcast effortlessly find an audience...heard, then repeated, ad infinitem. Those of us of sufficient age, whose memories (perhaps just a couple of decades) encompass a time when it was common for people of varying opinions to air their differences—to weather discussions that might turn to heated exchanges--yet rise from the table with continuing respect for one another's views. As we enter into these conversations, I ask that we continue to conduct ourselves with civility and kindness, in contrast to the current norm.

### Local, local, local

As you have throughout the past year, please continue to keep our local businesses in mind. There is little more difficult than operating a small business, even in the best of times. To call these times trying is an understatement, to say the least. Our businesses have been working harder than ever to keep themselves afloat, and can use any sup-

port that we can give them. When you do need to shop, please remember those three little words, local, local, local. I am confident our businesses are open for business, and will welcome you with a smile.

We have spoken often in these pages of the generosity of so many of our citizens, and I will do so again here. We are blessed to have a group of volunteers calling our elderly residents in the age group of 65 years plus in order to try and help them arrange to receive a vaccination shot. We are not always able to connect, so you can help this effort simply by reaching out to your neighbors or your acquaintances who might be in this category.

More than a year has passed since the beginning of this virus, and its influence on so many aspects of what we once would have called "day to day life" in Deep River. Who has not had friendships strained by the stricture to mask up and keep our distance? How many restaurant seats have languished in storage in the effort to create more empty space—for fewer diners? Not until this scourge has finally been banished will we fully appreciate the extent of the loss of the events that have been denied us.

But take heart: Winter solstice is well past. The Sun climbs higher by the day, slowly, yes, but noticeably. Spring is coming.

In the meanwhile, here is the old mantra, it works: Wash your hands. Keep your distance whenever you can. Wear your mask.

Clarence Percival Dietsch (1881—1961) studied sculpture at the New York School of Art and at the American Academy in Rome. Deep River's Doughboy is listed among his international body of work (Rome, By 1927 the fund had reached Baltimore, Houston, New York City). Dietsch joined the American Expeditionary Force in 1918 and was later awarded a medal for his work as an instructor of soldiers blinded in battle.

## The Doughboy

Thomas Latham (Deep River High School class of 1924) is the Doughboy-he was the model for the sculpture's creator, C. Percival Dietsch. May 31, 1972 a reporter from the New Haven Register interviewed Tom. The resulting article, in paraphrase, follows:

Latham remembered clearly that during the First World War "almost every family in town was involved in the war effort: if a pupil didn't have someone in the war, fighting, he had someone close to him in the Home Guard." Young people of the day were united in feeling, along with adults, that this was a war to save our country.

Following the armistice in 1918, it became a tradition for the school's senior class to raise money each spring toward a memorial to those who had served. \$750. But what could be done with \$750? The apparent answer was 'Not much." Tom told the


Alumnae Association that he might have a solution. He would ask whether his friend, the noted sculptor, C. Percival Dietsch, could help. Dietsch spent summers at Ayers Point in Old Saybrook. Dietsch offered his talents, gratis. His one condition was that Tom pose for the sculpture.

Those who knew Tom Latham say that the sculptor's representation is a perfect likeness.

By the 1970s the rigors of a half century of New England weather had seriously deteriorated the memorial. In 1980 the Deep River High School Alumni Association undertook a restoration project. Fortunately the original mold was still available, and the Association had the statue recast in bronze. The original concrete base had also suffered, so the Doughboy was given a more appropriate granite base (below)

Funding was private, through subscription of the townspeople. Rededication ceremonies were held on Memorial Day 1989. As they have since the original dedication in 1928, services continue to be a

part of the annual remembrance occasioned by Memorial Day. Deep River High School






was built in 1914. In 1952, together with Chester and Essex (our neighbors to the north and south) Deep River formed Regional School District #4, whose middle school and high school house grades seven through 12. Since then, the former high school, now approaching its centennial, has served Deep River's children from pre-Kindergarten through Sixth Grade.

Today the Doughboy, framed by evergreens, occupies its place of honor on the front lawn of the Deep River Elementary School on River Street.

"In memory of all students who attended the Deep River High School and served in the World War. Presented by the classes of 1918–1927. Rededicated on Memorial Day 1989 to honor all students and graduates of Deep River High School who served in all wars and conflicts of our country. Deep River High School Alumni."

### **New Permit Stickers:**

New permit stickers for both the Transfer Station and Town Parks are now available at the Town Clerk's Office and the Transfer Station. The Town Hall is currently open to the general public by appointment only while we weather the COVID-19 storm. We are keeping our regular office hours which are Monday-Wednesday, 9:00-4:00, Thursday, 9:00-6:30, and Friday, 9:00-noon. Please note: a current motor vehicle registration is required for each sticker issued.

### Residents:

- Transfer Station Permit Stickers are available to residents only and are required to use the Deep River Transfer Station.
- Park Permit Stickers are separate from the Transfer Station stickers. They allow parking / boat launching at Plattwood Park and the Town Landing.
- New Permit Stickers are issued biennially in January of odd years and should be displayed at the bottom of the driver's side windshield.
- Permit Stickers are free of charge to residents and may be obtained at the Town Clerk's office or at the Transfer Station year round. Please bring your Motor Vehicle Registration as proof of residence when obtaining a Permit Sticker. Please note that property owners who are not residents are not eligible for a Transfer Station Permit Sticker but may obtain a Parks sticker.

### COVID-19 Vaccines, cont.

Completing the registration in VAMS may take several days while the system verifies your eligibility, so it is important to begin as soon as possible.

- VAMS stands for Vaccine Administration Management System.
- This is the government's preferred method for you to schedule an appointment.
- To use this method, you MUST create a VAMS Account to get vaccinated. Click this link to create a VAMS Account, and then follow the instructions provided:

https://dphsubmissions.ct.gov/OnlineVaccine

- A unique email account for each person registering is required to use the VAMS System
- VAMS appointments are only being provided to those 65 and older.
- When searching for an appointment on VAMS try searching Old Saybrook (06475) There might be open appointments! (Again these appointments are currently only for anyone 65 or older).
- You MUST be registered in VAMS to schedule an appointment at Connecticut River Area Health District (CRAHD')s Vaccination Clinic!

#### **SOME VAMS TIPS:**

- If you are registering for a loved one or a friend, do NOT use your own email address! Instead, create a unique email address for them. You will need your email address when it is time for you to register yourself for a vaccine!
- If you already have a VAMS account, refresh your browser several times to view the appointment times for Old Saybrook. To make an appointment for the Old Syabrook clinic, you must be registered in VAMS\* and have your own email account.

### Deep River Assessor's Office

The 2020 Grand List filed with the Town Clerk on January 21, 2021, has a total net taxable value of \$533,440,117. This is an increase of \$22,846,852 over the 2019 net taxable Grand List. The Assessor's Office is very grateful to the taxpayers for their cooperation during the entire process of completing the Revaluation and the final assessments for the 2020 Grand List.

The Town of Deep River offers both State and Local Options for Tax Relief and Exemptions. Due to COVID-19 through Executive Order, the Homeowner's reapplication filing requirement has been suspended. Any taxpayer who was granted a benefit for Grand List Year 2018, will automatically maintain their benefits. Any new applicant should contact our office to arrange filing an application by May 15, 2021.

Homeowner's (Circuit Breaker) and Local Homeowner's - The application period for this program is February 1, 2021 through May 15, 2021. Persons who file must be 65 years of age by December 31, 2020, or totally disabled. There is a five-year residency requirement to be considered for the Local Homeowner's program.

Additional Veteran's Exemption – The application period for the Additional Veteran's Exemption is February 1, 2021 through October 1, 2021.

**Proof of income** is required when filing for the Homeowner's, Additional Veteran's and Local Homeowner's program. The income requirements are determined by the Office of Policy and Management and includes all taxable, non-taxable income, and social security income (Form SSA-1099). Persons who file **must be 65 years of age or totally disabled.** If you file an Income Tax Return, the Assessor's Office is required to copy that filed return as well as your Social Security Form SSA-1099.

Information on all properties continues to be available in the Assessor's Office and can be found on our website in the Assessor's Section at www.deepriverct.us. 

# The Higgins: The Vessel That Won WW2 Julian Mardjekaj Ms. Pitney - Grade 6

World War II was a war in which the free world was able to end Hitler and the Axis regime of terror on the world. Thousands of American soldiers sacrificed their lives for the greater good of society and should always be remembered as heroes. America's will to win and drive for technological advancement allowed for the introduction of the Higgins Boat as a military asset. The Higgins Boat had a major impact on America's victory and proved to be key in the transportation of troops, equipment and supplies. The Higgins Boat employed land and sea or amphibious warfare and provided a logistical stronghold that won the war.

It was June 6, 1944. Hundreds of Higgins Boats rushed towards the shore of Normandy France. Soldiers ducked as bullets were buzzing over their heads. The Higgins boat was swaying viciously side to side as the operator fought mother nature in an attempt to push through the oceans raft and reach shore. Once at shore, the boat ramps swung open and a group of soldiers unselfishly rushed off the boat, with one thing at mind, victory.

What made the Higgins boat popular amongst the U.S. Armed forces was its capability to transport troops via land and sea to the battlefield. This allowed soldiers to gather and attack from different fronts along the shore, thinning out the enemies focus. The layout of the Higgins included two gunners in the back, 36 soldiers up front and a vessel operator. Higgins also had the ability to hold 8,000 pounds of equipment. This allowed for versatility, creating the opportunity to transport more than just soldiers. Equipment such as armored vehicles and jeeps were often transported via the Higgins.

The Higgin's propulsion was built into the hull of the vessel, allowing it to be functional in only 10 inches of water. This was essential because it prevented soldiers from having to swim to shore and assured the safe arrival of essential equipment. Beach landings no longer required ports as the only way to transport troops or supplies from ship to shore. This meant that defending armies would now have to spread themselves thinner across entire coasts.

On D Day, hundreds of Higgins boats stormed the shores of Normandy France with soldiers, equipment and anything needed for the war effort against the Nazi's and its Axis counterparts. This widespread attack could not be beat. This is how the Higgin's Boat helped the Americans win World War II.



#### Happy New Year!

The Deep River Historical Society has been busy over the last few months preparing for a time when we can open our doors again.

In November we launched a series of three You Tube videos highlighting notable women from the past 100+ years in the tri-town area. With names and photos submitted from area residents, this video series features hundreds of women's contributions to our local community. The project was launched as a collaboration of the Chester, Deep River and Essex Historical Societies as part of the Women's Suffrage Centennial in 2020. Thanks to an outpouring of support, it will stretch into 2021, capturing the strengths and struggles of area women through images, captions, music and narration. You can find the videos through Deep River Historical Society's web site, www.deepriverhistoricalsociety.org. Click on News and scroll down to Celebrating Women. Part 1 was posted in November and Part 2 in January. Part 3 will be available in the spring. So, keep checking the website. Thank you to all who contributed. The Festival of Trees took on a new look this year due to COVID restrictions. Area non-profits, again, created beautiful trees that were set up around town for everyone to enjoy. Thank you to our Merchants who welcomed these trees into their businesses. CT River Valley Artists added some pieces of art in storefront windows to add to the festivities and many friends and neighbors decorated their homes as well. Photos of the trees can be found on our web site. Thank you to all who participated. We are looking forward to getting back to normal in 2021.

The Historical Bleach House was damaged in the fall of 2019. Repair and restoration is very expensive but we fortunately qualified for a grant. Due to COVID-19 restrictions, our volunteers were not able to start on the Bleach House repairs this summer. However, we are hoping that our grant allotment of \$9,000 will be allowed to be extended to 2021 so that the project will be started this spring. The first step will be to remove the glass on the south side of the structure. This will need to be performed by a professional commercial glass company. Then, the muntins will need to be taken down and replicated so that the glass can be replaced. This should extend the life of the structure. Since the entire project will cost over \$25,000, a fund raiser will be needed to cover the expense.

This year your membership donations will be even more critical as our annual fundraisers may again need to be canceled. Our operating expenses continue even though the Stone House and Carriage House are closed to the public.

As COVID-19 related restrictions are lifted, DRHS will again offer the Carriage House for rentals. It was a difficult decision to suspend rentals because they supply a significant portion of our yearly operating expenses. However, the safety of our community is more important than income.



The curatorial committee has been working behind closed doors to complete and polish several new exhibits in anticipation of opening our doors in the summer of 2021. This year marks the 75th anniversary of Ada Southworth Munson donating her family home to the Society. We would like to make this a special year, remembering Ada and her family and their contributions to Deep River. The suffragette exhibit highlighting 100 + years of Women's Achievements is awaiting its

first visitors. For two years we have been rearranging and organizing the Munson Gallery with a permanent exhibit we call "Wharf to Waterfall" which highlights the mills and factories of the Deep River Stream. This has been funded in part by Connecticut Humanities. We continue to be grateful to CT Humanities for the \$2,500 CARES grant to help DRHS cover some of our utility costs during 2020.

The DRHS Trustees met outside during the summer months wearing masks and maintaining social distancing. This winter, we will begin to meet via Zoom. One of the major issues that will be discussed is the Society's annual meeting which is usually held in March. Last year, the meeting was canceled, but DRHS is reluctant to cancel it again. However, the meeting may need to be held "remotely." Check the DRHS web site for notice.

So, watch the web site for news and dates. Stay well and we hope to see many of you when we are once again allowed to open our doors.

#### Planning & Zoning

## An Update from the Planning & Zoning Department: Can I Do That on My Property?

After a few months of getting our feet wet and playing catch up on permits, notices of violation, and inquiries, the Town's new Zoning Officers – Mike D'Amato and John Guszkowski – are attempting to find some rhythm and routine in our work. Permits continue to come in – focused largely on property expansions such as pools, decks, additions, and a few accessory apartments.

The most common question we get is from realtors and interested property buyers looking at a piece of land or a house and wondering "what can I do with this?" or "is my great idea for a business or an activity allowed here?" We thought it would be useful to give folks a head start on answering these questions. If you are looking to do something new with a piece of property, the first two key things to know are: 1) What zoning district is the property in; and 2) What uses are allowed in that zoning district.

To answer the first question, we recommend checking the property card on the Town's online appraisal records, hosted by Vision Government Solutions: http://gis.vgsi.com/deepriverct/Search.aspx. On this page, you can search for your property by address, account number, or property identification (map/block/lot). Once you've found the right property, you can review all sorts of details like sales history, property size, building details, and zoning district, which can be found in the "Land" section of the page, near the bottom. The Zone will be listed as some alphanumeric abbreviation like "R60" or "VCD," which indicates whether it is in a residential or commercial district and what general density is allowed.

You would then take this information and go to the Deep River Zoning Regulations, which are hosted on the Town's website: https://www.deepriverct.us/sites/g/ files/vyhlif2996/f/uploads/zoning\_regulations.pdf. This document contains the allowed uses and all of the associated regulations for allowing development and other land use issues. Starting on page 25 of these Regulations, you will find Section 4.10, the "Schedule of Uses," which is a long list of allowable uses of property in the Town of Deep River and the zoning districts where that use is allowed or prohibited. For instance, if the potential use in question is a Day Care Center, you would look down to Section 4.10.9, which is "Day Care Facilities." The R-80 district does not have any listing in that box, which means the use is not allowed in the R-80 district. R-60 and R-30 districts list it as "SxP," which means that the Day Care Facilities may be permitted, but require a Special Exception Permit, which involves an application to Planning & Zoning and a public hearing. If a use is listed as "X" or is blank, it is not allowed. If it has a "SPA," that means a Site Plan Application to Planning & Zoning is required, but no public hearing will be needed. An "AZP" means that the Town staff (ZEO) may review and approve the permit administratively.

In all cases, there are additional pieces of information that are needed – including maps, specific mapping plans, health department details, etc. – but this should be a first step on whether a certain use might be possible on a certain property. As always, we are here to answer questions – please reach out at zoning@deepriverct.us.






#### Deep River Merchants & Business Association


