



## STATE ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 2018

The State Election, legally warned, was held on November 6, 2018 at the Community Room at the Deep River Public Library from 6:00 a.m. until 8:00 p.m. Craig Rogoff served as Head Moderator. A total of 151 Absentee Ballots, including 3 Overseas Ballots for Federal Offices only were delivered to the poll by the Town Clerk. A total of 2401 votes were cast. Registered voters on the November 6, 2018, list totaled 3,612, including 34 voters who were registered through Election Day Registration. Voter turnout was 66%. The voters on the Official Check List at the opening of polls were registered as follows:
